Austin Rosebrooks and family, and Mrs. N. Stevens started for Newport yesterday morning for a few day's camping by the bounding sea.

J. J. Gaither, of Siletz, passed through town yesterday on his way to Otter Rock after his family, who have been camping there for several days.

Commissioner Bristow informs us that the fruit prospect in the vicinity of Nashville is excellent. His prune trees are so heavily loaded that he finds it necessary to thin them. The Nashville district promises to become a fine fruit section.

The Lewis-Scott wood case which has had a run through both the justice and circuit courts is not yet ended. John Logan et al, who appeared in the district court as the owners of the wood have sued H. Lewis in the county court for \$100 damages.

County Court was again held at Judge Burt's residence this term, owing to the Judge being unable to leave the house. Should he recover sufficiently he expects to start for Southern Oregon some time next week, where he hopes to improve his health.

County court has been in session yesterday and today, ending its labors this evening. No business of importance came before the court, their time being taken up principally in the consideration of bills, a large number of which came before them, owing to the expense of the recent term of district court. We could not get the proceedings in time for publication this week, but will give them in full next week.

County Treasurer Hyde has received the regular annual apportionment of state school money from the state treasurer. This fund amounts to \$1,245.30, and is based on a ratio of \$1.05 per scholar. This is a considerable heavier apportionment than was made last year, the per capita then being only about 85 cents. Under this apportionment Toledo district will receive \$163, which will be quite a material help to the school.

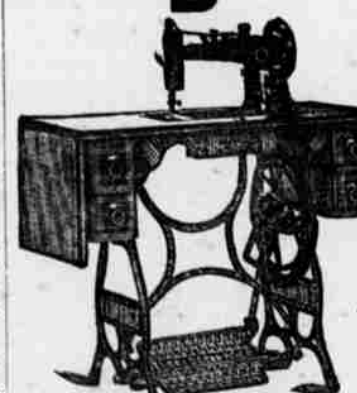
