Hon. John Minto, of Salem, the member of the State Horticultural board for this district, has written us an article for publication on the fruit situation in Lincoln county, which is very interesting to all fruit growers, but for lack of space are compelled to lay it over until next week.

The O. C. & C. railroad have set all the mills up the Santiam running cutting bridge timbers and ties for improving the road, and have a force of workmen engaged in putting the road in good condition. As soon as this is done some important developments may be expected on the road and surrounding country.

One of the best farms allotted to the Indians on the reservation is near what is called the "upper farm." It has 100 acres of good prairie land on it and yet the Indian to whom it belongs will not touch it sufficiently to make a living out of it. He is what the other Indians call a "lazy man." Some of his neighbors have cleared up large tracts and are making livings out of them.

Considerable feeling exists at Newport over some slurs cast upon their people in the recent writeup in the Oregonian, and particularly at the misstatements made concerning the harbor. This T. G. Jones, who posed as a special correspondent, is very well known by the old timers of Newport, and some of the old acquaintances do not speak in very glowing terms of him. Several years ago this Jones went to Newport, and in company with another gentleman started a paper there. He did not make a glittering success of it, owing to his extreme aversion to anything in the shape of manual labor, and he had no ability for brain work. In fact he was so lazy that he liked to have starved out, had not Sam Case taken pity on his forlorn condition and helped him out. It seems peculiar that such sea faring men as Capt. Winant, Capt. Patton, and a dozen others should pronounce Yaquina a good and safe harbor, while it remained this great man Jones to discover that it was of no value to commerce.

The geographical surveying party arrived in Toledo last Saturday. While here J. S. Diller, who is at the head of the party, visited Bensell & Ayle's coal mine, securing samples of coal and some fossils, also visited the mines located by the Toledo Coal company and Peterson, where he secured good samples of coal also shell fossils in the Toledo Coal company's tunnel.

While here he forwarded samples of all the different veins of coal, fossils and samples of the Rock creek granite to the Smithsonian Institute at Washington, D. C., to be thoroughly examined and reported on by specialists of that department. On Tuesday the party broke camp, Mr. Diller going to Newport and Cape Foulweather, while Frank M. Anderson went to Siletz, expecting to go down the river to examine some fossil beds which are exposed in that locality. These men are very pleasant gentlemen and while here unofficially informed our reporter that their belief was that good coal existed here in paying quantities. The party are now making only a hasty preliminary examination, and securing samples which are sent to the department with such other data as can be obtained, all of which information will be furnished the topographical parties, and by them prepared in a map, after which Mr. Diller expects to return and make a thorough survey of this entire section, the importance of which can be readily appreciated.

The Board of Equalization for Lincoln county, Oregon, will meet at the Court House of said county, at Toledo, Oregon, on September 9, 1895, for the purpose of examining and equalizing the taxes on the assessment roll for 1895. 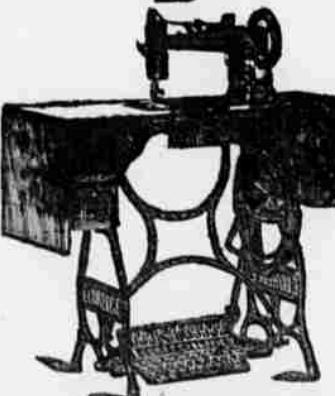
