The creamery started up promptly on the first of the month to run for the season. Rens Arnold is the butter maker this year, and is a first-class man in that capacity. The receipt of milk is not very heavy as yet, but it will increase rapidly as the feed gets better.

There has been many teams from the reservation over in the past few days after seed oats and seed potatoes. The acreage of oats on the reservation will be largely increased this year over last. There will be many acres sown by new settlers and the Indians are also greatly increasing their fields.

A. L. Baldwin came up from Alsea yesterday morning for a physician for Mrs. Jas. Harrison, of that place, who has been sick for some time. Dr. Carter was met at the train, and in the evening went on the train to Yaquina and thence to Waldport. We trust that the lady will get the necessary relief.

E. L. Davidson, of Newport, is up today on business. Mr. Davidson came from Portland to this county a couple of years ago to recover his health, which had been badly shattered. He is strong and healthy looking now, and is a living testimonial to the efficacy of our ocean scented ozone as a health restorer.

Capt. Geo. Harney, of the Siletz, deserves much credit for his manly action at this place last Tuesday. Some half dozen Indians got drunk here and Capt. Harney worked hard to get them started home. Treasurer Hyde has been exchanging gold coin for county warrants at a rapid rate during the past few days. The warrants have come in lively in response to his call published in the LEADER. He has paid out about \$6,000 during the past three days, the greater part of which has been paid to Lincoln county residents who have been holders of warrants.

Four or five drunk Indians came very near taking the town last Tuesday. It seems to us that the duty of the police officer of the city is very plain in such cases. The proper place for a drunk Indian, or white man either, is the lock-up. One thing is certain, the performances of last Tuesday on our streets was more of a disgrace to our city government than it was to the drunk Indians.

There is no longer a doubt that the republican nomination for joint representative will go again to J. D. Daly. Inasmuch as the republican county convention adopted a resolution endorsing Mitchell and Hermann, and as both of these gentlemen are pronounced for free coinage of silver, it will put Daly in an awkward position. It will be remembered that Daly voted forty days for Dolph and a gold standard last session of the legislature.

The Rochester quarry near Elk City, beginning ready to begin operations at an early date. A complete quarry plant has been ordered and shipped from St. Paul, Minnesota, and is expected to arrive in about three weeks. The plant will consist of a big double-boasting engine, a channeling machine, steam drill and all the necessary hoisting apparatus for two derricks. The plant will be first-class in every respect and will cost about \$6,000. We are informed that Mr. Rochester has a contract to fill as soon as he can get to operating and also a contract of about 5,000 tons to fill during the season. This will give the quarry about six or seven months' steady work.

There promises to be a red-hot fight in this precinct on precinct officers. The republicans have nominated Judge J. A. Hall for justice of the peace and Major J. C. Altree for constable. The democrats have nominated Hon. Frank Tillotson for justice and Capt. F. Harmon for constable. The populists have made no nominations for precinct officers but it is rumored that Col. G. T. Smith will be put up as a candidate for justice, and Sergt. J. M. K. Butler, constable. To further enliven the contest it is rumored that Gen. C. H. Ruhl will enter the field as an independent candidate for constable. These conditions, should they all arise, will insure a lively fight on precinct offices.

The Siletz saw mill has completed the sawing of the lumber for the cannery of Messrs. Church & Kern, to be built on the Siletz. The lumber amounts to about 70,000 feet, and will be rafted down the river. Mr. Val Wheeler, of Siletz, has the contract for rafting the lumber down, but is unable to do so at present owing to the low water in the river. The raft will probably have to be taken to pieces and run down the river. Mr. R. A. Miller, who has the contract to put up the buildings, informs us that the main building is to be 60x100, one story high, and two other buildings 20x40 two stories high. Mr. Miller will go down with a force of men just as soon as the lumber is on the ground, and expects to have the buildings enclosed within thirty days from the date of his commencing them.

Died.

KISOR.—At Philomath, Oregon, on Saturday, March 28, 1896, Geo. W. Kisor, aged 73 years and one month.

The deceased was an old pioneer of Oregon, coming across the plains in 1852, and settled in Benton county the next year. He was born in Ohio in 1823, and in 1846 he was married to Sarah Ann Freel, who still survives him.

For many years the deceased has been sorely afflicted, being paralyzed four years ago. Since then he has been a subject of constant care by his family. For several weeks he has been on the verge of death, and his children have been constantly by his bedside.

He leaves a wife and a family of four sons and three daughters. The remains were interred in the Newton cemetery on Sunday last.

Max Friendly Suicides.

Max Friendly committed suicide in Portland last Monday, blowing his brains out with a pistol of the British bull-dog pattern. The deceased was for many years a resident of Corvallis, being engaged in the saw-mill business. In the panic of 1893 he met with business reverses and was forced to make an assignment. Out of his assets his liabilities were liquidated in full, but it left him practically without means. These reverses preyed upon his mind, and it is supposed, unbalanced it. Twice while living in Corvallis he attempted to end his life by plunging into the waters of the Willamette, but was drawn out before life was extinct. Some time ago he moved from Corvallis to Portland, where he made the third and fatal attempt on his life.

This plank in the state populist platform says something whether it means it or not: We denounce the republican party for its entire failure to perform any promise it made to the people of Oregon in the year 1894, and hold it wholly responsible for the reckless and extravagant waste of the taxpayers' money by the legislative assembly of the year 1895."

The enormous circulation of such a magazine as The Ladies' Home Journal can, in a sense, be understood when it is said that during the last six months of 1895 there were printed, sold and circulated over four million copies—(in exact figures 4,058,891). Figures such as these give one some idea of the influence which may be exerted by even a single one of the modern magazines.

A bill is being pushed through for the admission of Arizona as a state. The population of Arizona is placed by its boomers at 80,000. It is probably less. At 80,000 it would have a smaller population than the county of Multnomah. If Arizona needs state government let it be attached to some of the little 2x4 states with which it neighbors, and when the time comes, if it ever does, when it is large enough to somewhere near take its place along with other states in population and wealth, then let it have statehood.

The efforts of Hermann and the balance of the Oregon delegation in the interests of Yaquina Bay cannot be over estimated. That the result is all that could be wished and hoped for is almost a certainty. The recent dispatch from Washington to the effect that Mr. Hermann had secured the incorporation into the river and harbor bill of a provision to appropriate \$25,000 to continue the work at Yaquina Bay, and to authorize the placing of the work under contract to complete the work according to the project

of the board of special engineers that made an examination of the bar last summer.

If this feature of the bill remains, and it is very likely that it will, it will call for the completion of the work within a period of three years, at an expenditure of \$1,025,000.

The placing of this work under the contract system, if the effort to do so is successful, will relieve and dispel all further doubt as to the future of the harbor. It also dispels all uncertainty as to what each successive congress is liable to do in the way of making or withholding appropriations to continue the work, and takes it out of the possibilities injurious congressional action.

The early action of congress is looked for on the river and harbor bill, and the assurance is expressed that the work on Yaquina Bay will remain in the bill.
