DEMOCRATIC STATE PLATFORM.

The democratic party of the state of Oregon, in convention assembled, do make, declare and adopt the following resolutions:

"First—Whereas, the present depressed condition of the country and the shrinkage of values are largely due to the financial system which has controlled the nation for more than 20 years last past, we, the democracy of the state of Oregon, hereby declare ourselves unalterably opposed to the single gold standard, and demand the immediate return to the constitutional standard of gold and silver by the restoration by the general government, independently of any foreign power, of the unrestricted coinage of both gold and silver into standard money at the ratio of 16 to 1, and upon terms of exact equality, as they existed prior to 1873, the silver coin to be a legal tender equally with gold for all debts and dues, public and private, and we denounce all discrimination by the government against either gold or silver currency of the country. We demand that the secretary of the treasury shall coin into standard silver dollars, as soon as practicable, all the silver bullion now in the treasury of the United States, which represents the silver seigniorage or coinage profit to the government; also all silver bullion that may hereafter be offered for coinage.

"Second—We demand the repeal of all specific contract laws, state and national.

"Third—We favor the construction of the Nicaragua canal, and its control by the general government.

"Fourth—We are in favor of a tariff for revenue only, so adjusted that it shall affect alike our commerce, our agriculture, our labor and our manufacture.

"Fifth—We demand of the general government the rigid enforcement of the Monroe doctrine.

"Sixth—We demand a reduction of all salaries, federal and state, commensurate with the depressed condition of the country; that the compensation of all state officers shall be kept strictly within the letter of the constitution; that all laws now existing providing extra fees or compensation for any duty or service imposed by law upon such officers shall be repealed.

"Seventh—We demand the repeal of the laws creating the railroad commission, and all other useless commissions.

"Eighth—We instruct our delegates to our national convention to support only a candidate in favor of the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1.

"Ninth—We demand the re-enactment of the mortgage tax law, and the amendment of our assessment laws so that all recorded indebtedness of the tax-payers' shall be deducted from his assessment.

"Tenth—We denounce the extravagant acts of the last legislature as co-extensive with fraud, jobbery, and squandering of the peoples' money, and we censure and hold the republican majority responsible for the present condition of our public debt and high rate of taxation.

"Eleventh—We favor a judicious expenditure of the public money for the purpose of opening up and improving our waterways and harbors.

"Twelfth—Religious difference should find no place in American politics, and the democratic party is unalterably opposed to the spirit of intolerant bigotry fostered for political purposes by those who seek to breed discord and animosities among the citizens of the republic; secret political bodies are a curse to party, state and nation. We heartily welcome the assistance of all good citizens who will co-operate in the suppression of any political movement organized for religious proscription.

"Thirteenth—Resolved that we, the democratic party of the state of Oregon in convention assembled,

hereby earnestly ask the congress of the United States to take up the bills now pending before their respective bodies, viz: the house of representatives and the senate of the United States, providing for a survival pension of the Indian war veterans of the United States, and pass said bills.

"Fourteenth—We favor the preservation of the salmon industry of the state by abolishing all fish traps fish wheels and small mesh gear below the lower cascades of the Columbia, and denounce the republican party of the state for refusing to keep its pledge to afford such urgent relief.

"We commend the president for his earnest efforts for tariff reform; for his wisdom in administering a government burdened with the accumulated evils of republican legislation; for his firmness in enforcing the Monroe doctrine, and for his courage and honesty in all things."

The hard luck of the old O. P. boys followed them to the very last in their efforts to get their back pay. Some two years ago a lot of the employes signed an agreement with Attorney Geo. Bingham, of Salem, to give him ten per cent. of all monies collected by him for the employes. Mr. Bingham began a suit against the Farmers Loan and Trust Co. for the amount of back pay due the employes. This suit was heard at Corvallis on demurrer some time ago and Mr. Bingham was knocked out. He took an appeal to the supreme court, which appeal is still pending. This is, as far as we can find out, the extent of Mr. Bingham's efforts for the men. When the recent referee's report was confirmed and the money ordered distributed, and after the money had been partly paid out, Mr. Bingham bobbed up and demanded a ten per cent. rake down on the lonely 93 1/4 per cent. of back pay allotted to the boys who had labored so hard for it. And he got it, too. He might have possibly been entitled to it under his contract, but what the boys would like to know is what he done to earn it. The money has all been distributed now, and it is not likely that anyone else will get a further haul from it.

The republicans of the Second judicial district have nominated W. E. Yates, of Corvallis, for district attorney. The contest in the convention was between Mr. Yates and Geo. M. Brown, the present incumbent. This nomination will reflect credit on their party and will help to atone for their grievous blunder of two years ago. Mr. Yates is entitled to this much being said for him at least. He is a man whose personal character is beyond the shadow of reproach. If this office falls to him when the plums are ripe in June, the people can rest assured that it will be in the hands of an honorable and upright man.

The stock market in Crook county is opening up. The Prineville Review says: "C. W. Barney, of Chicago, has bought about 10,000 head of yearling ewes in and around Prineville. The price paid was \$1.25 per head. They are bought for breeding purposes. The Sichel Cattle Company has sold 500 head of 3 and 4-year-old steers to a Montana syndicate, to be delivered in June at Huntington. H. E. Hershey, of Nebraska, has bought 10,000 head of 2-year-old wethers and they will be driven East and fed. The price paid was \$1.50.

Hon. John Burnett, the democratic nominee for supreme judge, is one of the pioneer lawyers of Oregon. He is a deep and profound lawyer.

There is strong talk of an independent candidate for congress in the second district. All of the present nominees are for free silver.
