WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

We wish some of our republican friends would explain what is really meant by that old chestnut that was revamped at the late republican state convention:

"The American people, from tradition and interest, favor bimetalism, and the Republican party demands the use of both gold and silver as standard money with such restrictions and under such provisions to be determined by legislation, as will secure the maintenance of the parity of values of the two metals, so that the purchasing and debt-paying power of the dollar, whether silver, gold or paper, shall be at all times equal.

The interest of the producers of the country—its farmers and its workmen—demand that every dollar, paper or coin, issued by the government shall be as good as any other dollar."

Of course the American people favor bimetalism, not from tradition or interest, but from sound business principles. There is no tradition about it. The financial condition our country is not governed by tradition. That utterance is simply humbug. And then what does it mean by "such restrictions and under such provisions to be determined by legislation, as will secure the maintenance of the parity of the two metals." Does it mean to make silver more valuable as bullion by closing the mints to it? If so, what about the law of supply and demand? Can you make a commodity rise in market value by removing by legislation the market for more than two-thirds of that commodity? A legislation for a parity of the two metals would be one that would open the mints to both or close them to both.

And then that little piece of soft soap about the farmers and the workmen demanding that every dollar shall be as good as any other dollar. That ought to catch lots of votes among the horny-handed farmers and laboring men. In order to make dollars so they can depend on "tradition and interest" while legislation is striking down one-half of the money of our country, thus making the other half just twice as valuable. Why did they not add still another clap-trap for the dry-goods men by demanding that "one yard stick shall be just as long as any other yard stick." Or for the butchers that "one pound of meat should weigh as much as any other pound of meat."

It seems to us that the whole thing is an evasion, an elusive jumble of words, a straddle and a cowardly makeshift. There is but two sides to the question. Bimetalism through equal coinage of both gold and silver, or gold monometalism by the coinage of gold only. The question cannot be evaded or straddled through "tradition or interest." A plain, unequivocal statement of the attitude of the party would have dispelled the mist which now envelops the people through the "straddle" declaration. The people are either for free silver or against it, and a party that dare not make a plain statement of its belief does not deserve the confidence of the people.

The Yaquina business man who favors West Yaquina for county seat is simply tearing down his own business. As it is now Yaquina secures the trade of the country on the north and surrounding the town and also the trade of the Beaver creek and contiguous country on the south. Should the county seat be located at West Yaquina there will be business houses located there also. This will cut off the south side trade entirely and leave Yaquina with but the north side trade. Should her business men move to the south side then they will lose the north side trade, which will then divide between Newport and Toledo. That is the situation for Yaquina business men to look at.

The thing which troubles the republicans the most is the fact that they can't tell just where to find one Wm. McKinley on the finance question. Is he for gold or for silver, or for both.

The state tax levied on Lincoln county this year amounts to about \$4 for each vote cast at the last election. It is interesting in connection with this to note what the county gets in return for the same. Well here is what we get directly: Care of one prisoner in the penitentiary; two suits pending in the supreme court; about ten days work for the district judge. The actual cost of these things would be about as follows: Cost of prisoner per year, \$150; time of three judges of supreme court, say a day on each case, or six days in all at \$10 per day, \$60; ten days attendance of district judge at \$10 per day, \$100; total \$310; balance for that mythical thing called state government, \$2,690. Would it not be a good idea to establish some more state commissions?

One Josiah Gideon, of Waldport, writes a letter which is published in last week's Yaquina Bay News, in which he seeks to justify, condole or set straight the action of one J. O. Stearns in connection with the office of county judge. Mr. Gideon seeks to have the odium of trying to step into a dead man's shoes, before the man was dead, taken from Stearns and placed on himself. It is just a little mystifying what Gideon is trying to get at. Nobody is bothering Mr. Stearns as we have heard of. It seems like they would get this matter straightened up after a time. Everybody has accepted their explanations, and in fact we don't suppose a half dozen people in the county cares anymore whether Stearns, or Gideon or anyone else wrote the petition or not. It is a matter of very little importance to the public. The republican county convention passed upon the matter from a political standpoint and we supposed that would be final. From the standpoint of a citizen's respect for the dead, the people have already formed an opinion, and all of the excuses that can be framed from now until the crack of doom will not change their idea one bit in the matter. Still, however, if it does Mr. Gideon any good to stir the matter up by further excuses, we don't suppose it will hurt anybody.
