AN IMPORTANT COMMUNICATION.

Newport, Or., May 2, 1896.

Editor LEADER:—Will you so kind as to allow me space in your valuable paper to do an act of simple justice to one of the greatest and best citizens, not only of Lincoln county, but of the state of Oregon. A man whose extreme modesty has heretofore kept him down, but who will now rise to the greatest heights of fame if his true-hearted friends, like myself, can help him out by placing his many great and glorious deeds and actions before a people that are hungering to give this great man his true meed of praise.

Being a modest man myself I have hesitated some time about writing on this subject, being afraid that the few weak words I might offer would be entirely inadequate of doing this man justice for his many good deeds. But a circumstance of this week finally tempted me to offer these few lines of praise for this worthy man to the all-powerful press.

This circumstance was the letter of "W. P. W." in the last issue of the News, published at this place. "W. P. W." may his tribe increase, attempts to give in one short half column an idea of what this great man and skillful navigator, Capt. Robertson, has done. And while I heartily coincide with "W. P. W." in all he has written, yet I feel that "the half has never yet been told." In his very able article he has only told of the Captain's indefatigable and well rewarded work on Yaquina Bay. He did not tell that the Captain sailed from New York before coming to this coast, and that the evidence is equally suggestive that it was his efforts that secured the improvement of the Hudson river to Albany, the blowing up of Hell Gate, and the laying of the great Atlantic cable to Timbuctoo. "W. P. W." should not only have given him credit for the enterprises named above, but is the evidence not equally as strong that the Captain was also responsible for the construction of the Eads jetty at the Mississippi river, the construction of the first great transcontinental railroad, the digging of the Chicago drainage canal and the education of Tom Platt, of New York, as a political boss? In the light of all of these things is it not scant praise to give this great and able man, to only say of him that he secured the appropriations for such a small harbor as Yaquina Bay? When the money is all expended that is contemplated on the improvement of Yaquina Bay there will have been only a paltry \$1,746,000 used. And this shows in itself another commendable trait in this great man. Many a man in his great station would not have fooled with anything so small as a million dollar project, but not so with the Captain. He, in his friendship for the people, will go to as much trouble for a little thing like that, as he did when he was taking the Federal census or selling town lots in Prior Scott's addition to What-you-may-call-it.

I might go on for columns and then give but a slight sketch of this great Captain's efforts for mankind in general, but I feel that I have

already transgressed on your space enough, and I fear that if I go further that some jealous minded people will think it is only an electioneering scheme, just because I nor "W. P. W." never happened to discover any of the Captain's great deeds before he received a nomination for office.

The forensic part of the campaign in Lincoln county will be opened tonight at this place by Hon. Harry Watkins, of McMinnville, who will speak in the interest of the populist party.

On the sewer that is being built for the city of Salem by the state of Oregon, there are 55 men employed, 51 of which are from Marion county. This is the work that was promised to be distributed to men from various parts of the state.

The impression that prevails to some extent, and in fact has been fostered by some, that if the county seat is located at West Yaquina by a vote of the people in June, that the towns of Yaquina and West Yaquina will be jointly incorporated under one name and the court house located on this side of the river, had just as well be exploded and be done with it. It was a very nice proposition, but unfortunately for those interested the law stands in the way. There are several supreme court decisions on the matter. If the people votes the county seat to West Yaquina, the county seat will go there and stay there until a special act of the legislature brings it before the people again.

There is an increasing interest in Angora goats in many parts of the world, due to scarcity of mohair to meet the demand for fashionable stuffs for fashionable people. There is not one good reason why these animals are not kept in great numbers in this country. They thrive in almost any section of the United States, but are especially suited to rough, hilly lands, such as can be found in almost every state. They shear from 4 to six pounds with the pure breeds, and when all the conditions are favorable, twice as much. The skins of a yearling half or three quarter bloods are worth as much as sheep. They are healthy and comparatively free from the ravages of dogs.—Ex.

The month of April, 1896, had 4.09 inches of rainfall, and, while this amount is in excess of the average amount by 0.83 of an inch, yet the total amount since September 1, 1895, is only 28.22 inches, a deficiency of 16.83 inches. In April of past years, the heaviest rainfall was in 1883, when 7.88 inches fell, again as much as the amount that fell this year in April. In five of the past twentyfive Aprils, the amount that fell this year has been exceeded. This past month, however, has the first rank in the number of days on which rain fell, amounting to 24 days on which a trace or more fell, and 20 days on which .04 of an inch or more fell. In April, 1893, when the total amount was 4.89 inches, it fell on 19 days to the amount of .04 of an inch or more on each day. On an average there are 12 days in April, on which .04 of an inch or more falls. When the "oldest inhabitant" says that April, 1896, had more rain than ever before, don't you believe him, for the records show five Aprils in the past 25 years that had more and one year with again as much. Last year the rainy season was over on April 14. This year, at the present time, the distribution of the atmosphere is such as pertains to the winter season, and, until it changes, showers may be expected. The weather bureau continues to expect rain.
