

## How Are the Mighty Fallen!

What a spectacle is present in Oregon, in the political field, and especially in the great first congressional district. Where for the past decade, or longer, it has been the custom of the republican nominee for congress to come out of the campaign after election with a plurality ranging all the way from 5,000 to 7,000 votes, we find now the republican nominee grabbing and grasping for one vote from this county, two votes from that county, and so on, in the almost vain hope of counting out or defeating the candidate of the populist party. And in the wind up the republican is claimed to be elected by a paltry 74 votes. Ye Gods and little fishes! Think of the bygone Binger Hermann fooling around with a little bunch of 74 votes. He would have knocked off a thousand or such a matter to the opposition if he thought it would have been any accommodation to them. But the Tongue folks find it necessary to seek and search for the one or two votes that a careful recount might bring them. Is it to this end that the new blood that was injected into the party a couple of years ago has brought the great republican party of the state of Oregon?

## Who is Elected To Congress?

This is the question that has absorbed the attention of the people ever since election day, and the mails are closely watched for late news from the fight. What is purported to be the official count gives the office to Tongue, by a plurality of 74. To bring this about it was necessary to find errors in the first returns from several counties, notably 200 from Yamhill and 148 from Linn, both being in favor of Tongue. It would seem then that Mr. Tongue will receive the certificate of election. It is also stated that Vanderburg will bring a contest.

It is rumored that there is every prospect for some big litigation in connection with the railroad property, right-of-way, docks, etc., at Yaquina. It is said that Mr. Hammond recently made a trip to San Francisco to see Mr. Wm. M. Hoag to try to purchase the terminal grounds, but failed to make a purchase. Mr. Hoag was willing to lease but not willing to sell. Mr. Hammond did not care about owning a railroad without any terminal facilities and so stated. He intimated that if he could not buy the property outright, he would bring condemnation proceedings and buy the property through the medium of the law. Mr. Hoag did not take kindly to this idea, and there is where the lawsuit is liable to come in. What there is in it cannot be said for a certainty, but a considerable color of truth is given the above, by the fact that since Mr. Hammond's return from San Francisco, a surveyor has been at work at the docks and terminus surveying the ground occupied by the side-tracks, docks, wharves, etc. If the case goes into the courts it will probably make some interesting litigation.

Now let us get together and make a long pull and a strong pull for Lincoln County, and every part thereof. Let us open and improve our roads, induce new settlers to locate with us, build up our farms and towns. Let us bury all past differences that may have existed between localities heretofore, and unite for the common good. If one part of the county prospers the whole county must share it to a certain extent;

## The Prospect Is Bright.

The prospect for the Yaquina Bay country is very bright at the present time. Events have worked to bring this country and its resources prominently before the whole coast. One great factor that will bring industry and labor to our country is the adoption of the project for a deep water harbor by congress. The project which is now recognized and made a law calls for the expenditure of \$1,025,000 on the harbor. Of the continuance and completion of this work there is no further doubt. It is now by law placed under the continuing contract system, and contracts for the completion thereof will be duly let by the secretary of war.

The expenditure of this million dollars on the works here means a great deal, locally, for our people. A large amount of sawed timber and piling will be used and this will put men at work in the woods, in the saw mills and on the river. A vast amount of stone will be used for the jetties, and this will put more men at work in the quarries and on the transporting lines. All of these men must use the produce of our farms and ranches, and a market will thus be made for our farmer's produce. All these men will buy goods of our merchants, and altogether business will be greatly stimulated.

Nor will the mere expenditure of the money appropriated be the greatest benefit. With the improved condition of the harbor entrance and reduced transportation enterprises have already been started along the road. The large saw mill that is now going into the Santiam country, and which will be in operation in a short time, expects to ship heavily by sailing schooners to all coast points where there is an available market. This is made possible by reason of the especial facilities they have for logging, the excellent grade of their timber, and the very low rate of transportation they receive.

The deepening of the harbor entrance to a thirty foot channel also means the addition of a vast amount of ocean commerce to the commerce now going and coming through our harbor. Yaquina harbor is the natural outlet for that portion of the great Willamette valley between Salem and Roseburg. As surely as water travels along the line of the least resistance, so will the produce of the world on their road to the markets. With a deep water entrance so that sea going vessels of any draft can enter, and a railroad tapping the interior, the commerce of that country is bound to flow through Yaquina harbor.

There is every ground to believe, also, that with the increased harbor facilities and the other evidences of prosperity, that the owners of the O. C. & E. will extend the line into that great empire of Central Oregon. This extension would mean the pouring of a large volume of commerce through the Yaquina gateway.

All these things will mean labor and business for our country. It will build up the towns and the country. It is not unreasonable to suppose that many of the clouds which have overshadowed our country for the past few years are now about to be dispelled.

There is going to be a decided shortage in the fruit crop of this county; particularly in the crop of prunes, plums and pears. The severe weather in the late spring seriously injured these crops, and the output will be very light. Early apples were also damaged. Late apples and all kinds of small fruits promise well at this time. Strawberries are just beginning to turn and a full crop is expected.
