The Pioneer rock quarry has received a new hoisting engine for use at the quarry. It is a fine piece of machinery, of about double the capacity of the old engine in use at the quarry.

Krogstad's mill has sawed out the lumber for the bridge at Elk City, and also for the bridge across the Olalla at this place. The bridge at Elk will be put in by the Pepin Brothers, who have the contract from the county for the same, and the bridge across the Olalla will be put in by volunteer labor.

Prof. J. T. Ewing will begin a six months' term of school in the Parrish district next Monday. Mr. Ewing taught the previous term there in the old school building. This term he will teach in a new and commodious school building that the enterprising patrons of that district have recently erected.

All the judges and clerks of election who did not file a bill for their services before the meeting of the county court last week, will have to wait two months for their pay, as the commissioners refused to allow the bills as shown by the clerk's schedule, and decided that a bill must be filed before the court for each separate man's services. This will render it necessary for each of them to send a bill to the clerk before the next term of court.

Jas. Booth was up from Yaquina yesterday and produced his naturalization papers before County Clerk Jones, and received his certificate of election as justice of the peace for Yaquina precinct, the protest filed against him being groundless in the face of the papers produced by Mr. Booth. The papers show that Mr. Booth took out his final papers and became a full-fledged citizen of the United States in November, 1885. The papers were taken out before Judge Bean and were attested to by B. W. Wilson as county clerk. So Mr. Booth will dispense justice within the boundaries of Yaquina precinct for the next two years unless something of a heavier nature knocks him out.

The railroad company have put most of the bridge men at work again. This morning Jack Waugh, of this place, went back to work after a vacation of several months.

The tug Resolute has been taken down to the lower bay, and we understand that she will be put on the Newport-Yaquina route. She is now being repaired and overhauled and will be put on the run at an early date. It is expected, also, that she will have some towing to do in connection with the lumber schooners which will run in connection with the Cascade lumber business.

The case of M. S. Woodcock vs. Lincoln county, which was argued on demurrer before Judge Fullerton last term of court, has been passed upon by the court, and the demurrer was sustained. It will be remembered that this was a case where Woodcock was foreclosing a mortgage upon some property on which the taxes had not been paid, and which were sold last December for delinquent taxes. Woodcock brought suit to set aside the tax claims. The county through its attorney, J. K. Weatherford, demurred to the complaint, and it was this demurrer that Judge Fullerton sustained. The status of the case now stands just as it did before Mr. Woodcock began his suit. The tax claims are held to be good and it is very probable that the taxes will be soon forthcoming.

The ownership of the hotel and court house buildings at this place has passed from M. M. Hufford to Valentine Theil. Mr. Theil states that he intends repainting and fixing both buildings up in good shape and style.

The appropriation dance given at the Blake House last Tuesday night was pronounced by all present to have been one of the most enjoyable held in Toledo for some time. The supper served by Mrs. Waugh, at the hotel, was one of the excellent features of the occasion.

We are informed that F. M. Stanton and his son Fred will begin the erection of a livery barn in this place at an early date. The barn will be located at the corner of 4th and Hill streets, and when the barn is completed they will stock it up with some good rigs and will run a first-class barn.

Inspectors McDermott and Edwards were down to the Bay last Tuesday night and inspected the tug Resolute. They gave her a rigid inspection and as a result several life preservers, water pails, and like appliances were condemned. The tug had taken out a license at the custom house at Yaquina to carry 200 passengers. This license the inspectors cut down to 100.

A change in the time of the trains went into effect on the O. C. & E. last Monday. The mixed accommodation train has been abandoned and the regular passenger train put on again with a freight train out one day and back the next. The eastbound passenger train now pass Toledo at 7:30 a. m., and the westbound at 5:10 p. m. This makes a very convenient service for this place again.
