Don't Worry, Friend.

Our brother of the Corvallis Times seems to be greatly troubled in his mind about the vote cast by the Siletz Indians at the recent election, and seems to particularly hold Capt. Geo. Harney responsible for the way the Indians voted. Two issues of the Times has had leading editorials upon the matter, and the would-be sarcasm that prevades these articles bear a wonderful resemblance to the articles penned by a resident of Corvallis and published in the Newport News, of this county, and signed as "Voter," "Citizen," etc., only those articles were upon the subject of county-seat.

But thrusting this suspicion aside, we feel justified in defending Captain Harney and his people against the screeds of the Times, and feel that if the Times was fully informed upon the subject of the Indians voting that it would refuse to prostitute its columns further.

A word or two in this connection might give some light upon the recent vote on the Siletz. Previous to the election no man knew how the Indians were going to vote. It was an unknown element, and being one it was beset on all sides and was approached in all kinds of manner. Men without political conscience tried to buy them, and unprincipled wretches tried to influence them by whiskey. With all these influences around them the fact remains that the election was most orderly and decorous. The Indians refused the bribes offered them and voted as they thought best. It is a fact that some unprincipled wretches, who are well known, sent no less than ten gallons of whiskey from Corvallis the week before election and had it cached out on Rock creek to be used on the day before and the day of election, but this Capt. Harney, who seems to worry the Times so, actually stood guard over the road to Rock creek from Saturday night until Monday noon and prevented the degraded wretches from getting to or from that whiskey, and that whole ten gallons of good Corvallis liquor remained untouched as far as Capt. Harney and his people were concerned. Does the Times deplore the action of the Indian Harney, or that of the white(?) man of Corvallis that sent the whiskey there? Which was the better citizen? The election at the Siletz was held on the honor of the Indians, and as a result it was quiet and law-abiding. We hope that the Times will not allow some person who tried by the use of money, bribes, promises, whiskey and everything but honesty to get Capt. Harney and the other Indians to vote a certain way on a certain proposition, to further vent his spleen against a people who refused to be bought or bribed.
