From California.

Prof. D. C. Rosebrooks, who left for Santa Catalina Island, off the coast of California, writes home to his parents here an interesting letter from which we are permitted to publish the following extracts which will be of interest to many of our readers.

"Avalon, Santa Catalina Island, June 7, 1896.

Dear Folks at home:—

Well, here we are, settled at last in our new home, so to speak, and enjoying ourselves as only one can in such a beautiful climate as this.

The climate here reminds one of Toledo and around the ranch during July and August. The most beautiful flowers and palms here on the island. There is a hedge of rose geraniums and all other different kinds growing wild, so to speak, and all the way from three to eight feet high and all in full bloom. I tell you they are beautiful to look at. The town of Avalon here is finely laid out. The most beautiful shade trees have been set out, forming drives and walks everywhere.

Now in regard to the island and its owners, and a short history of it. Santa Catalina Island was owned by an English syndicate and finely stocked with sheep, the idea being to make a sheep ranch of it, but everything did not go right so the Island was sold for debt and Banning brothers, the present owners, and the company that I am playing for, bid it in for \$165,000. They began preparing it for a summer and winter resort. They built hotels and dancing pavilions, skating rink, yachts, pleasure boats and everything necessary for such a place. They spent \$40,000 for water and sewerage. They own coasting steamers, tugs, etc. They bought a steamer to run between San Pedro and the Island about the size of the steamer Willamette Valley, and she cost something like \$80,000 or \$85,000. Besides this they have another smaller steamer that runs when the season is slack and crowds are small.

The great rush will begin about the 1st of July, when thousands of people flock to the Island to spend the summer. In order to accommodate the people the company have put up tents by the hundred and furnished like bed rooms, others for dining rooms that will feed a thousand people at a meal. The company have put out some twenty deer on the Island to breed and game the Island. Besides these there are mountain goats in abundance, but they are very wild and hard to shoot. The water for swimming is fine, just like around Depot slough during August, and no breakers, only a slight swell in the way.

I think that Oregon is a much prettier state than California except Northern California or the Sacramento valley, only there is so much rain there and not enough here. The hills here are like the hills in the Wallamette valley, during the month of August, dry and burnt kind of a yellow color. But Sacramento and the San Joaquin valleys are lovely. They are right in the midst of haying when we went through. I tell you it looked odd, for if you remember we left very rainy weather in Oregon."

One of Our Summer Resorts.

A correspondent gives the following graphic description of Otter Rock, one of Lincoln county's summer resorts:

Otter Rock takes its name from the fact that many sea otters make it their home. It extends out into the Pacific ocean about a mile, and at the extreme western point it is very rough and broken, having many natural wonders, such as caverns and caves. In front of this cape rolls the grand old Pacific ocean, and the breakers strike the rocks sending out great sheets of spray, sometimes hundreds of feet high into the tops of the stately green trees that form the background to this cape.

One has only to cast their eyes to the north and there view high green mountains towering up to high heaven, with now and then a river or bay indenting the coast, while to the south, towards Newport, is a lovely, sandy beach of seven miles with only a break at Cape Foulweather, the farthest point west. Here is safe, warm bathing, and a pebbly beach in front abounding with water agates, and many other shells and curiosities belonging to Mother Ocean. Just south of the Cape is a sheltered cove where canoes and small boats may be safely launched at almost any time between the 1st of June and the 1st of October, and can be paddled out or rowed about upon the broad bosom of the Pacific, where a ride on the ocean waves or deep sea fishing may be indulged in to one's heart's content. Last September I saw a canoe load of young ladies go out and safely return without escort.

Sitting upon the rocks one may cast hook into the salty tide and catch rock cod, red fish, kelp, bass and tom cod, and if one desires to angle for mountain trout a stroll of a mile and a half through green forests will bring one to Rock Creek which abounds with the speckled beauties, which creek, with but few exceptions, the banks have never been trod by the foot of white men. In close proximity there is plenty of game, including deer, bear and elk. Shell fish, such as razor clams, Eastern clams, mussels and rock oysters can be had at low tide.

Of the twenty thousand people who have visited Newport the past three years, many of them have visited this delightful spot. In fact, going to Newport without seeing Otter Rock would be like going to Astoria without seeing Seaside, or visiting the Cascades without seeing Crater lake.

The Republican Convention.

The national republican convention is now in session in St. Louis, having convened there on the 16th. So far there has been no nominations made, but there is no doubt but that McKinley will be given that honor. The greatest interest centers on the money plank of the platform, and as the convention is overwhelmingly in favor of gold it will be a gold standard platform. It is predicted in this event, that several of the western states will bolt the convention. The nomination of the candidate for president will probably occur today.

Corvallis is the throes of another scandal in which a railroad man, and a prominent citizen cuts large figures. The case has traversed the police courts, but the papers of that town seem to be strangely silent upon the subject. It is very probable that if the parties were less prominent the publicity would be correspondingly greater.
