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The Silver Vote in Oregon.

A careful analysis of the vote of the last election on congressman shows that the silver vote in Oregon predominates over the gold by about 2 to 1 or over. In the first district the lines were not distinctly drawn on silver, but it is fair to assume that the vote cast for Myers and for Vandenburg were silver votes, while a part of those cast for Tongue were also silver votes. But call the Tongue vote a gold vote and the result shows 27,387 silver votes in the first district as against 19,282 gold votes. In the second district the lines were plainly drawn. The gold men had an independent candidate solely on that issue, and it is fair to assume that he polled the gold vote of his district. His vote was 8,800, and the vote of the prohibitionist, who had also declared himself for gold, was 764, or a total vote of 9,564. All the other candidates in the second district were avowed free silver men, and theirs would be a silver vote. The total of their vote was 32,077 or nearly four times as many as the gold vote. The total gold vote in the state was 28,856 and the total silver vote was 59,464, that is, if all of Tongue's vote is considered a gold vote. But it is fair to presume that a large number of republicans who voted for Tongue were also in favor of silver. In fact the silver sentiment is stronger in the first district than in the second. The vote cast for Tongue falls only about 2,000 below that cast for Ellis and Northup both, in the second district. The ratio there stood about one and one-half silver votes to one gold vote. The same ratio in the first district would make Tongue's vote consist of about 12,800 silver votes and 8,400 gold votes. This would increase the silver vote in the state to 71,464 and cut the gold vote down to 16,500, and that is probably about their relative standing.

When the pisciculturist will be able to tell us the truth about the salmon and its habits is very uncertain. Every time a theory is advanced, along comes some fact to overthrow it. One of the Astoria canneries a few days ago received a salmon, caught in a trap in Baker's bay, with the shaft of an Indian spear sticking through the head, which it is thought had been there for six or eight months. It could not be determined from just where the salmon came, or where it had been speared, but it was thought that the implement was that of an Alaska Indian.

Congressman Ellis, who is a strong free silver advocate, claims that he can consistently stand on the republican platform, because it declares against free coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, but at no other ratio. That is the merest bosh. He can stand on the republican platform in Oregon simply because the great mass of the rank and file of the party in Oregon are unqualifiedly in favor of free silver. But Ellis' straddle does not mark him with the great brand of statesmanship.

For Free Silver.

Editor LEADER:—I take the privilege of writing a few lines for publication to the voters of Lincoln county, who are of the same mind of myself in regard to the financial question, and who wish to see a president elected who is for free silver, as well as a tried man and a statesman. To all of those I would say that now is the time to organize a free silver club in every precinct so that we may be in fighting trim to advance the cause of silver. With all these things that may arise before us it is time in my opinion, to be up and at work, for I can't believe that the voters of Lincoln county want to see their children enslaved, turned out of doors and made friendless and beggars. Put your shoulders to the silver wheel and we will win in November. So organize at once, is the advice of a poor voter.

The record is as follows: First, 1856, Philadelphia, one ballot; second, 1860, Chicago, four ballots; Lincoln; third, 1864, Baltimore, one ballot; Lincoln; fourth, 1868, Chicago, one ballot; Grant; fifth, 1872, Philadelphia, one ballot; Grant; sixth, 1876, Cincinnati, seven ballots; Hayes; seventh, 1880, Chicago, thirty-six ballots; Garfield; eighth, 1884, Chicago, four ballots; Blaine; ninth, 1888, Chicago, eight ballots; Harrison; tenth, 1892, Minneapolis, one ballot; Harrison; eleventh, 1896, St. Louis, one ballot; McKinley.
