Where are They At?

The republican national conven-
tion has declared for a distinctly
gold standard in its national plat-
form. So plain and decisive is this
declaration that no man need be
deceived thereby. The question
then occurs as to what becomes of
that large class of republicans that
do not believe in a further con-
traction of the currency and a
corresponding fall in prices and
values, which must of a necessity
follow. Are they in the party or
out of it? Take for instance the
position of a large part of the re-
publican party in Oregon. Two
years ago they rebelled against this
same gold doctrine, and the result
was a combination that defeated
Senator Dolph for re-election. The
same element predominated in the
convention of the second congres-
sional district and nominated Ellis,
an out and out silver man. In the
first district there was a large ele-
ment of them who followed Binger
Hermann's banner to defeat. Now
where are all of those people, in the
party or out of it? Where are the
Sol Hirschs, the Jonathan Bournes,
the Barkleys, the Hofers, the Kin-
caids, and all of that class? This is
a burning question to the people
and especially to the democratic and
populist parties. Will they go to
the populists or will they come over
to the democrats, after they shall
have declared for free silver in their
convention next month? As far as
the democrats are concerned, if they
are headed for that party it would
like to be known, so that suitable
arrangements could be made.
There is a part of the crowd that it
would be well to vaccinate against.

E. J. McClanahan has been re-
lieved of his duties as "deputy fish
and game protector" of Lane
county. He seems to have had
peculiar notions about his duties as
game warden. It appears that he
has tried to keep others from buying
and transporting deer skins during
the close season so that he might
monopolize the business himself.
The following is taken from the
late circuit court proceedings:
State of Oregon vs. E. J. Mc-
Clanahan and E. T. Reed. Judge-
ment for transporting deer skins.
Arraigned June 10. Plea of guilty
entered. Time waived and sen-
tence passed at 1 o'clock. Fine of

Angora Goat Raising.

One of the industries to which
this country is peculiarly adopted,
and to which the attention of many
of our farmers and ranchmen are
turning, is that of Angora goat
raising. The greatly increased
consumption of fabrics made from
mohair has stimulated this industry
during the past few years, and the
demand for that product has been
strong.

Lincoln county, as we stated first,
is peculiarly adapted to the goat
industry. The Angoras thrive and
do well wherever they can browse
on grubs and brush. The rough-
ness of the land is no hindrance to
them, as long as they can find any-
thing to browse upon. They do
not care for grazing, like sheep,
but they thrive on underbrush.

The Angoras are not to be con-
founded with the ordinary Mexican
goat in their habits. The Angoras
are a domestic animal. They will
return to the fold at night, and
need but very little care. About
the only time they need any care is
at kidding time, when the mothers
are apt to desert the kids if not
looked after. During the winter
time in this country they do almost
as well in the woods as they do in
the summer, and require but very
little, if any, feed.

They are valuable both from the
mohair which they yield and for
their meat. The average goat will
yield about four pounds of mohair,
and this product is selling this year
for from 25 to 35 cents per pound.
Thus the very ordinary goat will
bring one dollar per year for its
clip, and in this country that is
nearly all profit. The flesh of the
goat is more highly prized as an
article of food by many than mut-
ton, and it brings about the same
price in the market. The goats
increase about as rapidly as sheep.
In addition to the above good
points for Angora goats they are
very valuable in a country like this
for cleaning up the brush. It is
said that 100 goats in a brush patch
are equal to 25 Chiramen. Goat
raising will be one of the great
industries of our county in a few
years.
