Either Foolish, or Worse.

A populist paper published out at Albany, called the Imprint, surely takes the prize for downright gall and nerve, if not something thing worse. In a recent issue this paper said:

"When the Imprint determines to do a thing, it knows no such word as fail. Pursuant to request of the Imprint about twenty Siletz Indians were in Albany during the week for the purpose of being interviewed upon the late election, and ascertaining if fraud were lurking in the ballot box in the reservation precinct. An interpreter and two attorneys were sent for, and the 'Boston men' and Indians got right down to business. Each Indian was armed with a government document proclaiming his right to vote. It was learned from the Indians that there were 125 Indian voters in the Siletz reservation precinct. Out of this number 69 were avowedly for Vanderburg, while the remaining 56 stood upon doubtful grounds. The official returns show that just two Indians voted for Vanderburg. Does this savor of fraud? Does it bear the ear-marks of a free and honest election? The Indians are ready to swear that they wanted to, and believe they did, vote for Vanderburg and Yaquina Bay, but where are the votes to show for it? Two Indian votes out of 125, for Vanderburg, when 69 were openly anti-Tongue! The Imprint will continue its investigation, and there may be some fun yet."

Of all the rot ever published by a paper, the above is the worst. In the first place the statement that twenty Indians, or any other number of them, went to Albany on the request of the editor of the Imprint is a fabrication, pure and simple. Again, we seriously doubt if there are twenty Indians on the reservation that cannot speak English, and a great number of them can speak and write it much more fluently than the editor of the Imprint. We would like to know just what kind of a "government document" the Indians had at Albany which evidenced their right to vote? Then again, how could twenty Indians speak for sixty-nine?

The fact of the matter is, that the whole gush of the Imprint in the above article is a pure fabrication. We venture to declare and dare the Imprint man to disprove it, that there wasn't twenty Indians from the Siletz in Albany at that time; that there never was an interpreter and two attorneys sent for; that not one Indian ever told the editor of the Imprint that he or any other Indian voted for Vanderburg. Now if the Imprint man did not create his article out of whole cloth, let him give the names of the twenty Indians that were at Albany, or the name of any one of them; let him give the name of the interpreter, or the names of the attorneys.

The LEADER is and was as much opposed to Tongue as the Imprint man could possibly have been. Not only that, but it believes in honest elections, and if Mr. Vanderburg was elected it will fight just as hard as the Imprint to have him seated. But if Mr. Vanderburg depends on the manufactured stuff as published by the Imprint, all his efforts will only take him farther away from his seat in congress.

If Mr. Vanderburg was defrauded of his election it looks very much like it might have occurred right in Albany or in Linn county. Let the Imprint man explain that "mistake" of 148 votes "discovered" in the count of Linn county. That would have given Vanderburg his seat. It might possibly be that the Imprint is howling at the Indians to cover up something at home.

Gen. Harrison on Our Finances.

Ex-President Harrison will discuss our national finances in an article on "The Secretary of the Treasury," which will appear in the August issue of 'The Ladies' Home Journal.' He will tell briefly of the origin of our financial system; its expansion or development; how the nation raises its revenues, and disburses its moneys; and detail the faults of our system of financing. Referring to the methods necessary to maintain our gold reserve General Harrison expresses himself with evident disapproval, and says that "the present situation would be absurd if it were not so serious." The increase or the diminish of the gold reserve, the ex-President asserts, powerfully affects every interest, and the "mending of existing conditions will be a task for the wisest and strongest statesmanship."

The ex-President clearly intimates that successful financing is extremely difficult by the present methods. Upon this point he says: "If fifty dollars would suffice to hold \$50,000,000 in the Treasury the Secretary could not expend that small sum. He must stand by until the gold is gone, and then sell bonds to get it back. The result is that the banks and the brokers are often able to make play of the Treasury. A financial institution whose board transacts its business in public is at a disadvantage."

Yaquina Bay Improvement.

News comes from Washington that the money is now available for the improvements recommended by the River and Harbor bill, which passed both houses of congress over the president's veto.

One million and twenty-five thousand dollars was appropriated for improvement of the harbor of Yaquina Bay, under the contract system, by which continuous work will be done until the work is completed.

About \$700,000 has already been expended on this harbor, and the results so far have more than realized the expectations of the engineers.

They have now over 20 feet of water on the bar.

A special commission of engineers was appointed about a year ago to examine and report upon the feasibility of increasing the depth of water on the bar, and the result of their recommendation is the present appropriation to extend the north and south jetties about a quarter of a mile out to sea, crossing the outer reef and confining the waters, so that the sand will be sluiced off to a further depth of six feet, giving them a harbor that will admit vessels drawing about 30 feet. Yaquina Bay seems to be the natural outlet for the Willamette valley, add the timber in the Cascade range, and as they already have a railroad penetrating these points, we may look for lively times at Yaquina.

Work on the present improvement will last for four or five years, and during its continuance many men will be employed and much money expended.—Evening Tribune.
