Assessing Railroad Lands.

Last year the unimproved railroad land in Lincoln county was assessed at 68 cents per acre, while unimproved land belonging to farmers and ranchers lying alongside was assessed at several times that amount. A great part of these lands are lieu lands, and were selected by the railroad companies in lieu of other lands in various parts of the state. In our opinion this was a rank injustice. We do not know what the present assessor is rating these lands at, but we hope he will not discriminate in favor of any company or corporation. In this county there are large bodies of land held by corporations and non-resident speculators. These lands lie idle; they are made to produce nothing, and no efforts are made to improve them, and yet, heretofore they have been assessed at about one-third of what unimproved land lying along-side of it, but belonging to some honest, hard-working man who is trying to make a home and improve the county is assessed at. This is not fair. If there is any discrimination at all in the assessment of these lands it should be in favor of the home-builder and not the speculator.

The principle of taxing the home-builders and improvers of our county and letting the speculators off almost scot free is wrong, and we hope that it will be abandoned in this county. All unimproved land of equal location should be assessed equally at least.

After the river and harbor bill had been passed over the president's veto, the people of Newport felt that it would be very proper for the people of the Bay to express their appreciation of the hard and earnest work of the Oregon delegation in congress in behalf of Yaquina Bay in some fitting manner. Accordingly at a meeting held there Dr. Bayley was selected as a committee to communicate with the Oregon delegation and tender them a reception in the way of a big clam bake at some time that would be convenient to the gentlemen. Dr. Bayley is in recent receipt of a letter from Senator Mitchell who speaks in behalf of the entire delegation, and the letter assures the people of the Bay that their invitation is highly regarded by the recipients, and that they will hasten to take advantage of it as soon as they shall all arrive in Oregon. This will not be until about the latter part of July or the first of August. At that time, though, the whole Bay country will unite in giving a big clam-bake in honor of the work done by Oregon's senators and representatives in behalf of Yaquina Bay.

The New County Officers.

The changes in the various county offices occasioned by the recent election will not be many in this county. In the offices of clerk, sheriff and treasurer there will be no changes, each of these officers being their own successor. The terms of the new county officers should begin on the first Monday in July, but as the county court will not at that time have had an opportunity to pass upon the bonds of the new officers the old ones will have to hold over one day. The county court will hold a special term on Tuesday, the 7, at which time they will pass upon the bonds. The incoming officers are F. A. Godwin, commissioner; S. G. Irvin, county superintendent; Z. M. Derrick, surveyor, and T. M. Coombs, coroner. Hurley Lutz, the assessor-elect, does not assume the duties of his office until next January.

The democratic national convention at Chicago will be controlled by the silver men. Of this there is no further doubt. In fact the silver forces will probably be strong enough to carry the convention and nominate silver candidates under the two-thirds rule. The present indications are that the candidate for president will be either Bland, of Missouri, or Boies, of Iowa. Either of them on a silver platform would sweep the west and the south. The issue will come squarely on silver and will be fought to a finish. The people are in earnest. There will be no straddling, no dividing. The fight will be for the life or death of silver.

Gov. Lord has officially proclaimed the several state and district offices duly elected, and the pluralities of the same. They are in part as follows: Congress, first district—Thos. H. Tongue, 63; second district—W. R. Ellis, 378. Supreme judge—R. S. Bean, 14,323. Prosecuting attorney, second district—W. E. Yates, 1070 (majority). Member state board of equalization, second district—Robt. Walker, 329. Joint representative, Benton and Lincoln counties—E. R. Lake, 249.

The appropriations for government work for the present year are now available. For completing the present project at Yaquina Bay there is an appropriation of \$25,000, which is now available, and will be expended at once. After that the work goes under the continuing contract system under which a million dollars will be expended.
