The campers are coming to the beach and beautiful groves and mountains of Lincoln county in large numbers. A fortnight spent recreating on some of our beaches, or in a tent pitched on some grassy flat on our beautiful rivers and creeks, is an event that rejuvenates the tired mind and body and makes it a green spot in memory for long years to come.

A Mr. Hotchkiss, a New York millionaire, spent Saturday and Sunday on Yaquina Bay looking up the opportunities for promising investments. He has been interested by Mr. Hammond in this country. Mr. Hotchkiss is also interested in the new lumbering mills that are going up in the Cascades. The gentleman only represents one of a class of investors that our harbor appropriations is sure to bring us.

The engine "Corvallis" was brought over from Albany last Monday and was taken to the shops at Yaquina for repair. The "Corvallis" is the pioneer engine of the O. C. & E., and was known as "Uncle Billy Hoag's" engine. It differs materially from the engines now on the road, the drive wheels being very small, but the boys say that she can handle freight cars all right, and also make good time on the road.

Kern Bros. cannery is being pushed rapidly forward to completion in order to have it ready for operation by the time the salmon season opens on August 15. The buildings are completed and a part of the machinery is already in place, and by the time the first salmon can be caught in the Siletz this year the cannery will be ready to receive it. We understand that the price for fish paid will be ten cents for silversides and twenty-five cents for chinooks.

Sheriff Landis informs us that he will close the 1895 tax rolls promptly on August 1st, and begin to make out his delinquent report. All of those who are not fortunate enough to be the possessor of a tax receipt dated before that date, will find greatly added costs when they come to make settlement. The sheriff and county court have been very lenient with the taxpayers, but a time must come to close the rolls, and that time has been set for August 1st.

J. B. Montgomery, the Portland capitalist, who has been enjoying some of the joys of Siletz fishing, prefaces an article on finance in the Oregonian with the following words: "I am here catching the lusty trout; and let me say that if there is any more beautiful stream in the world than the Siletz, I don't want to fish in it. Its bottom is covered with boulders from the size of your fist to as large as a cart; rapids alternating with a long reach of comparatively smooth water; cascades and springs emptying their icy waters into the main stream every quarter to a half mile. Altogether, it is an ideal stream for trout and boating. You can start from Colonel Gaither's house on the reservation, fish down stream, shoot a dozen rapids, making a great bend, and land after six miles of fishing within 300 yards of your point of departure."
