District Court.

The regular July term of the
district court for Lincoln county
convened promptly at 9 o'clock
last Monday morning. The grand
jury was drawn, and was composed
of the following jurors: J. H.
Maine, M. J. Allphin, A. J. Miller,
W. H. Harrison, J. M. Start, A.
H. Hampton and A. E. Altree.
Mr. J. H. Maine was appointed
foreman, and the grand jury after
being instructed by the court re-
tired to the deliberations under the
charge of the veteran bailiff, J. H.
Bevins. The grand jury after be-
ing in session until Wednesday
noon, made its final report, which
is given below. During its session
it was called on to investigate two
cases that had been bound over,
and in each case returned a not
true bill. It also investigated a
few other cases laid before it, but
found no charge worthy to base an
indictment upon.

There was but one jury trial had
during the term. This was the
case of John McCullum vs. Mary
Fitzpatrick, and was a suit brought
for wages for labor claimed to have
been performed for the defendant
in and around the Monterey hotel.
This case was tried on Monday,
and the selection of the jury was a
little out of the ordinary, as not a
single member was challenged or
excused. The case was hotly con-
tested, and was submitted to the
jury about 4 o'clock. After deliber-
ating until about ten o'clock that
night the jury returned a verdict
for \$273.62, being the full amount
sued for with interest.
