The LEADER recognizes that in
matter of the appointment of a
county judge for Lincoln county
that it has no influence, and also,
it has no interest further than to
see a good safe and conservative
man appointed. The appointment
will be made by a republican gov-
ernor, and it will undoubtedly be a
republican. So it is a republican
fight, and as such, the LEADER is
not in it.

But there is one argument being
used by a faction that reflects upon
the town of Toledo, and in that we
do have some interest, and will try
and correct the statement. It is
asserted by the friends of one of the
aspirants that the "Toledo ring,"
as they call it, is trying to "hog"
all of the county offices. This state-
ment will not bear the search-light
of truth. Let us see: Since Lin-
coln county has been organized the
officers have been as follows: Ap-
pointed by Gov. Penoyer: G. A.
Landis, sheriff, and Rev. Chas.
Booth, superintendent, Newport;
B. F. Jones, clerk, and H. Denlin-
ger, treasurer, Toledo; D. P. Blue,
judge, T. E. Parker, assessor, and
Thos. Russell, coroner, Yaquina;
J. O. Stearns, commissioner, and
Josiah Gideon, surveyor, Waldport;
and M. L. Trapp, commissioner,
Chitwood. Under these appoint-
ments Toledo had clerk and treas-
urer; Newport had sheriff and su-
perintendent; Waldport had survey-
or and one commissioner; Yaquina
had judge, assessor and coroner,
and the whole east end of the coun-
ty above Toledo had one commis-
sioner.

Under the election two years ago
the offices were distributed as fol-
lows: J. D. Daly, representative, G.
A. Landis, sheriff, and C. H. Wil-
liams, commissioner, Newport; B.
F. Jones, clerk, and Geo. Bethers,
superintendent, Toledo; T. E. Par-
ker, assessor, Yaquina; J. L. Hyde,
treasurer, Little Elk; Josiah Gideon,
surveyor, Waldport; S. V. Burt,
judge, and Dr. Carter, coroner, Elk
City; and J. J. Bristow, commis-
sioner, Nashville. Since that time
the elected assessor died and Silas
Howell was appointed and is now
filling the unexpired term. Thus
we see that Toledo had the clerk
and the school superintendent,
Newport the sheriff, representative
and commissioner, Yaquina the as-
sessor, Elk City the judge and cor-
oner, Little Elk the surveyor, Nash-
ville a commissioner, and Waldport
the surveyor, and for half of the
term the assessor.

Last June the offices were dis-
tributed by the people as follows:
Toledo, B. F. Jones, clerk; New-
port, S. G. Irvin, superintendent
and G. A. Landis, sheriff; Siletz,
Hurley Lutz, assessor; Salmon Riv-
er, Z. M. Derrick, surveyor; Little
Elk, J. L. Hyde, treasurer; Beaver
creek, T. N. Coombs, coroner;
Nashville, F. A. Godwin, commis-
sioner. As it now stands Toledo
has but one county officer and one
only, and has had but three since
the organization of the county.
We do not believe that to a fair-
minded man that there is sufficient
evidence in the lists given above to
justify the charge that Toledo is
trying to "hog" all the offices.
We honestly believe that the par-
ties who set up that cry would have
more influence with Gov. Lord by
not trying to deceive him, as the
Governor has no doubt investigated
this matter thoroughly.
