For one we will be heartily glad when the election is over. If it is to be McKinley we will try and stand it with the balance of them. If Bryan triumphs, we hope that the opposition will be of the same forgiving spirit. Meanwhile our interests are identical. We have no gold bugs, nor silver bugs. What benefits my neighbor is bound to benefit me in some degree. If McKinley is elected we hope that events will prove that we are and have been mistaken, for God help the poor if times do not improve in some shape. The lesson of hard times is being brought home to the people of this land with terrible force. And pity the party that gets into power at this election and does not bring relief to the laboring masses of the country. The people are aroused. If Bryan and free silver wins and relief be not brought about, the people will utterly destroy them, politically. If McKinley wins and his shibboleth of protection and gold does not bring relief, nothing will be left of it but the office holders. Relief the people want and must have.

Should the mints be thrown open to the coinage of silver at a ratio of sixteen to one, the foreigner who brought bullion to this country could get it coined into American dollars. After he had turned his bullion into American money, he would have money that he could not use nowhere else but in America. The most advantageous thing then for him to do would be to purchase American products, take the products back to the country he came from, and leave the money here. It could be readily seen that such a transaction would be of more advantage to the American producers than the coining of American silver, only he would be practically selling his goods in a foreign market and creating a scarcity of his products in the home market. Any large amount of such transactions would maintain if not appreciate the price of home products while it caused an influx of foreign capital. Certainly protection merely prevents foreign goods from coming to this country except upon the payment of heavy duties which ultimately come out of the pockets of the American consumer.

President Harrison said in his message sent to congress in December 1890, six months after the passage of the Sherman silver purchase bill, and of the McKinley bill, that "the enlargement of our currency by the silver bill undoubtedly gave an upward tendency to trade and had a marked effect on prices; but this natural and desired effect of the silver legislation was by many erroneously attributed to the tariff act."

Jesse Grant, son of President Grant, is a red-hot Bryan man. He recently remarked with much vehemence, that, "If my father could vote today he would vote for Wm. J. Bryan for president of the United States." Who said anarchist?

The contest of J. H. Bryant vs. Peter Hagen was up in the local land office today, and the hearing was postponed until December 15. In it is involved title to 160 acres, a little northwest of Toledo, in Lincoln county. Hagen died before his final proof had been passed by the local office, and in due time his claim was canceled. Bryant entered a coal land contest of Hagen's homestead, but that was held up because of imperfections. Before Hagen's death he mortgaged a part of the claim to U. G. Hale, of Albany, who has since foreclosed the mortgage, and comes in and protests against Bryant obtaining any rights in the land. Bryant has been opening a coal mine in the face of Hale's protest, and that matter has gone through the circuit court, and is now in the supreme court, for adjudication of title, while the real title has never passed from the government.—Oregonian.
