

Who Are the Repudiators?

One of the favorite epithets that the followers of a British gold standard love to hurl at the free silver men is that of "repudiators." Because the silver men want to cut down the ever-increasing purchasing power of the gold dollar as measured in products of labor, they are held to be anarchists and repudiators. Let every fair-minded and candid man cast his eye around and actually note who are the repudiators. First bear in mind that there are two kinds of repudiationists; the one who repudiates in money and the one who repudiates in the products of labor. Of the two the latter is the greater evil doer, for labor is in the sale and only superstructure upon which the whole fabric of social and economic government or relations stand. Now arrayed this year we find one class or kinds of classes on one side of the question, and other kinds on the other. On the side that believes in both gold and silver as the money of ultimate redemption—the money of the constitution—we find the great mass of laboring people, wage earners by manual toil, the producers, and the great body of agriculturists of the country. These constitute the principal strength, numerically of the free silver hosts. On the other side are arrayed every trust, corporation and syndicate in the land, nearly every railroad corporation, every land grant swindler and nine-tenths of the bankers and money lenders. It is true that there are many toilers and wage earners that have followed the banner of their party to that side of the financial question, but their ideas or hopes and beliefs do not obtain in this issue. The others predominate and overtop them. Now of the first class who are called repudiators, we candidly ask if they are the real ones that in everyday transactions are liable to repudiation. They are not. They are the ones who pay the full amount nominated in the bond. Not only the full amount, but under the skillful manipulations of some of the other classes they are made to pay double the amount by the continued appreciation of the dollar and the continued depreciation of their products. These men are not nor never will be repudiators. But how about the others? Did anyone ever hear of a Gould or a Vanderbilt seeking to evade a just and honest tax, the income tax, for instance? Did anyone ever hear of an Astor going to London to reside to avoid paying his personal property tax? Did anyone ever hear of land grant swindlers being perpetrated by great railroad magnates, whereby they secured twice the number of acres of land they were entitled to under the law? Did anyone ever hear of the attempt of Collis P. Huntington to evade the payment of the just and honest debts owed by the Pacific railroads to the government for money loaned? Did anyone ever hear of them paying the government the interest they owed during the past ten years on this vast debt? Or to bring it right down home, did anyone ever hear of the Southern Pacific railroad refusing to pay taxes on its lands in the county of Lincoln when assessed at the same price other lands of like character were, and threatening to put the county to endless expense and trouble by useless and unjust litigation if the payment of these taxes were attempted to be enforced? Are any of these things repudiation? If they are, please remember that not one of these men, trusts or corporations are supporting Wm. J. Bryan and free silver.

Well, its only a little less than two weeks before the agony will be over, and we will know whether its Bryan or McKinley.

Our attention has been called to an able editorial in the Newport News, of two weeks ago, the substance of which was, that the reason the contract for the completion of the new project for deepening Yaquina harbor has not been let, was because contractors were afraid to bid in the face of the free silver agitation, not knowing what kind of money they would receive in payment therefor. It is an insult to the intelligence of every reader of the News to print such wilfully false and misleading statements. The reason no bids have been received is simply because none have been asked for. The News knows that. Let the department fulfill its duty under the bill and there will be plenty of bidders, and they will take their pay in lawful money of the United States, either gold or silver. If further proof of this was needed we have only to recite the fact that the very week the News published its misleading statement that the firm of Wolf & Zwicker, of Portland, were awarded the contract to build two torpedo boats for the government. There were six of these boats to build and the government received more than twice six bids to build them. Does this look like bidders were afraid to bid on account of the money they would be paid in?
