Principle Above Party.

Never in the political history of our country since 1861 has there been such a breaking and loosening of political ties as there has been among men of all parties this year. Party lines are broken down, crushed and trampled under with astonishing indifference by men of all parties in this campaign. They have come upon troublous times in the economic affairs of our country. The conditions which exist now are unusual and unprecedented. Poverty in the midst of plenty. A nation brought to a standstill by false laws or doctrines. Thousands tramp the country for work, while farmers who have labor to perform cannot hire it done, even though their granaries be full to bursting. Business of all kinds at standstill. Funny things will bob up even in a hot political canvas, for instance the following dispatch sent from Newport to the Oregonian:

"R. A. Bensell returned yesterday from a tour through the southern part of the county, in the interests of the republican party. He addressed the citizens of Yahats, Five Rivers, Lobster, Tidewater and Ona, and also spoke in Alsea, Benton county. He was well received and listened to with marked attention. The sentiment in favor of McKinley runs high at all the points visited."

We like that last about sentiment being so strong for McKinley. All the points named in this county will not give McKinley fifty votes, and we doubt very much if they give him forty. They gave Judge Bean just forty-nine and Tom Tongue thirty-five last June. Sentiment is about all McKinley will get this fall.

If Lincoln county wants to keep in line with the balance of the state it will have to vote for Bryan next Tuesday.

Lincoln County for Bryan.

A careful poll and canvas of the county this week shows that it undoubtedly is safely for Bryan. The reports from every precinct but one indicate gains from the republican ranks over last June, and from the one precinct that shows no gain reports no losses. The gains are the heaviest in the thickly settled parts of the county. The vote for Tongue last June was 467, and the combined vote for Myers and Vandenburg was 610, or 143 more than Tongue received. The poll made of the various precincts have been made to compare with the vote for congressman last June. The vote in Siletz precinct is estimated as it was last June. It is not believed that the Indians will vote as they did last June for congressman, as many of them were induced to vote for some republicans through a trick in the shape of a letter purporting to come from Senator Mitchell. The Indians have discovered the trick that was played upon them, and naturally do not feel very good over it. But to allow the vote on the Siletz to remain the same, and every estimate or poll places Bryan's majority in Lincoln county at not less than one hundred.

The Official Programme.

The grand sporting event is to come off on November 3rd. Here is a copy of the official programme:

The National Steeple chase—To be run over course of the United States, November 3, 1896, over forty-five hurdles. Entries—1. The thoroughbred pacer Billy Bryan, sired by Patriotism, dam Popularity; to be ridden by Intelligence. 2. The piebald hack Billy McKinley, sired by Plutocracy, dam Boodle; ridden by Mark Hanna. 3. The mongrel gelding Jack Palmer (a ringer,) sired by Corporation, dammed by Everybody, and ridden by Cheek.

Betting—16 to 1 on Billy Bryan, 53 to 100 on Billy McKinley, any old odds on the mongrel. Entrance to race track by ballot only.

The Oregonian of yesterday closes an editorial with these remarkable words: "Naturally, he and they, and all other mountebanks, decayed philosophers and deadbeats, are for Bryan." Such language is outrageous. In Lincoln county more than six hundred, honest, industrious and law-abiding citizens will cast their ballots for Wm. J. Bryan and a patriotic, American administration, and in their name we hurl back at that paper its gross insult, and brand its every utterance that tends to cast discredit upon those whose political convictions will cause them to vote for Mr. Bryan, as the basest calumny.
