DISTRICT COURT.

A Short Docket, With but Little Litigation.

District court for the regular January term convened last Monday. The docket was not a very lengthy one and the court cleared up the business in two days and adjourned for the term. Not a jury trial was had, and the expense of securing a jury and the mileage and attendance of the jury was of no avail. The grand jury after being in session two days returned one true bill and one not true bills. The true bill was the State of Oregon vs. Geo. Crowder, on the charge of burglary. The defendant, which was a boy only a little under fifteen years of age, plead guilty and on Tuesday was sentenced to one year in the reform school.

Having finished all business pre sented, we respectfully submit this our final report, and ask to be excused from further attendance.
