### The Job Case Ended.

The last of the Job, Job and Davis cases was reached in this county last Tuesday. There was only one remaining on the docket, and that was the State of Oregon vs. Zephin Job, being an indictment returned by the grand jury on November 28, 1893, for the larceny of public money. When this case was called last Monday the district attorney filed the following motion, which was allowed by the court:

"Comes now the State of Oregon by W. E. Yates, district attorney, and moves the court to dismiss the indictment against Z. Job for the crime of larceny of public funds—filed Nov. 28, 1893. This motion is made in the interest of public justice and for the purpose of saving Lincoln county the expense of a trial without advantage, as the district attorney believes that conviction under the law and evidence produced in the trial of M. M. Davis and the affidavits filed herein, could not be secured, and that non-suit would probably be granted by the court as it was heretofore.

The history of these cases are familiar to many of the readers of the LEADER. The grand jury of the November 1893 term of court returned an indictment against Z. Job, B. R. Job and M. M. Davis, charging them with larceny of public money, the larceny consisting of having received money on deposit belonged to Lincoln county and failing and refusing to pay over and deliver the same when demanded. At the time of the indictment S. W. Condon was district attorney, and he vigorously pressed the case. The defense secured continuances of the case until the July 1895, term when the case against B. R. Job was dismissed on motion of the then district attorney Geo. M. Brown. At the same term the case against M. M. Davis was tried and resulted in the court instructing the jury to return a verdict of acquittal for the defendant. The case against Z. Job was again continued from time to time during District-Attorney Brown's term of office and was handed on down as a sort of legacy to District Attorney Yates, who after giving the matter due consideration filed the motion as above. This action on the part of Mr. Yates was the best, perhaps, under the circumstances. That a moral crime had been committed is beyond doubt, but in view of the adverse decisions of not only other courts of the state, but of the very court itself in which the trial must have been had, and of the great lapse of time since the indictment was returned, Mr. Yates could not hope for a conviction by the most vigorous prosecution, and to have put the defendant on trial would only have made needless costs and expense for the taxpayers of the county to pay without justice being in any manner vindicated. In view of this state of affairs it is probably the best to get rid of it and stop the expense.

Old Judge Hayden, of Polk, met Dr. Driver at the door of the senate chamber the other day. The judge and the doctor had been friends for many years. When the judge met him, he said in his own rough and honest manner: "Doctor, you have been praying for me for the last forty years, but I'll be d—d if you ever caught me among such a crowd as I have now caught you. Now, doctor, come outside and let me pray for you." The doctor, however, didn't think the prayers of such men as his friend, the judge, would amount to much, and so he didn't go. And thus the gentleman from Polk was saved the trouble of interceding for his old time friend.

### NOW CLOSED UP.

#### The Job Bank Assignment Ended and the Assignee Discharged.

The Job assignment came to an end yesterday afternoon, and the assignee has been discharged and his bondsmen exonerated. At an adjourned term of Judge Fullerton's court M. M. Davis, acting for Assignee Bryson, reported progress made in disbursing the final ten and one-half per cent. dividend. Except in the case of a few claims, creditors have received their checks, and the checks have been cashed. Cash to cover the few remaining checks will be placed on deposit at the First National and the checks will be turned over to the clerk of the court, there to be held, until creditors call for them.

In his supplemental report the assignee recapitulates the total receipts and disbursements during the three and one-half years the property has been in his hands, and it turns out that the accrued interest on notes held by the bank and collected by the assignee, together with the rents likewise collected more than pay the expenses of the assignment, including the fees of the assignee and expenses of litigation; so that creditors so far as expenses are concerned have not suffered a cent of loss by reason of the delay in closing up the assignment—a showing that reflects most creditably on the assignee.
