WAY OUT OF DATE.

State Senator Tolbert Carter, made a speech at Salem last week which created a sensation to say the least. It seems as though, according to Mr. Carter, that Senator Mitchell and O. N. Denny went to Senator Carter one night last week and represented to him that they had secured the promises of enough other members of the legislature to go into a joint convention to make up forty-five, and that if he, Carter, would go in that would make forty-six and thus secure Mitchell's election. He has been living out there on his farm on Soap creek; has been paying his debts, dealing honestly with his neighbors, and the poor old man imagines that everybody else ought to be honest because he is. Senator Carter ought to be ashamed of himself for being so ignorant.
