WHAT THEY THINK OF BONDS.

Opinions Expressed by Some of our Leading Citizens and Taxpayers Think of the Bond Question.

The bond question is now absorbing the attention of the people of Toledo these days. They will be called upon next Saturday to decide whether the city shall issue bonds to the extent of \$2,500 for water works or general improvement, or not. As on all important questions opinions differ largely, some of our best citizens and heaviest taxpayers being on each side of the question. The LEADER man interviewed several of our citizens upon the subject last Monday and herewith give their opinions in an abbreviated form:

B. F. Jones, county clerk and mayor of the city.—“We have just undertaken street work which will take at least \$400 to complete, and to plank the crossings will take more. The city needs and must have a public landing or wharf, it can't keep on using railroad or private property for this purpose. I do not believe in incurring a warrant indebtedness to exceed \$200. To make the improvements named above would create a greater debt than I believe it wise to issue warrants for. The work can be done much cheaper now than when times are good. The rate of insurance on Front street is 10 per cent. To put water hydrants there would reduce the rate one-half, but this cannot be done unless the bonds are issued. I am in favor of bonds.”

M. Gregson, owner of the Toledo saw mill.—“I think that if the town was to expend the \$2,500 it would greatly help it, and if the interest does not exceed 6 per cent it will not be a burden. I would be in favor of the bonds.”

R. Campbell.—“I am not in favor of the bonds.”

Attorney F. D. Carson.—“Not being a taxpayer I will not vote to tax other people.”

J. S. Akin.—“I have no opinion to express.”

Attorney H. Denlinger, Jr.—“I am not in favor of bonds on general principles, though there are times when they are justifiable. I think they ought to be for some definite and specific purpose. I would only be in favor of bonds for some purpose that was an absolute necessity.”

N. Snow, merchant.—“I have formed no opinion yet. Have not fully investigated it, think it would be a good idea to go slow and pay as you go.”

R. A. Arnold.—“I have no opinion to express.”

Mrs. C. G. Copeland, merchant.—“I think the idea of bonding is a very bad one.”

O. O. Krogstad, druggist.—“The object for which the bonds are proposed are not sufficiently specific. Had it been for some specific object, such as a light plant, city hall or some industry, I would have been in favor of it. I am unable to see any sufficient returns in the proposition. I am not in favor of the proposition as it now stands.”

C. L. Gowell, merchant.—“It's a business proposition; the best business proposition that can be offered for the city's interest.”

A. Waugh.—“I have no opinion to express.”

J. H. McNeil, merchant.—“I will vote against the bonds.”

T. P. Fish, merchant.—“I am opposed to it; taxes are heavy

enough now.”

E. F. Garr, butcher.—“I am opposed to any bonds.”

J. A. Hall.—“I have formed no opinion.”

H. Owen.—“No opinion.”

W. E. Rich, postmaster.—“I think that much more can be done with \$2,500 in a lump than can be done with a much greater amount of money scattered along. I am in favor of the bonds.”

GOOD APPLES.

To raise good apples you should commence now, by spraying your trees with kerosene emulsion. By examining the opening leaf buds you will find aphids has already commenced his destructive work. This kerosene emulsion is readily compounded and will be found a very useful article not only for trees, but also for destroying lice on cabbage, turnips, rosebushes and chickens, and fleas on dogs. Dissolve half-pound of hard soap in hot water; put half-gallon of kerosene in the hot solution and churn until there is a compact, semi-solid mass; then add five gallons of water. For spraying or washing trees use one pint of this mixture to five gallons of water.

Beware of using poisonous sprays while the trees are in bloom or you may kill the bees and poison the honey.

As a rule, much the largest quantity of apples raised in this county are worthless, save for stock feed, from the cause that the trees are starved and generally neglected.

While a tree is attaining maturity it has probably absorbed all the potash and lime in the soil, and therefore cannot find these constituents in the soil, which are absolutely indispensable for the production of good fruit. Clear the moss from the trunk and limbs of your trees with a wash composed of one pound of potash to three gallons of water, applied with a swab attached to end of a forked stick. This also destroys the bugs and worms and renovates and beautifies the bark and fertilizes the tree. It will pay you well to try it. You can raise good marketable apples if you try. I take it for granted you know the soil should be stirred around the trees and kept free from weeds until July.
