Taxes are still coming in, but not so fast as they were in the latter part of March. The Oregon & California railroad company paid their taxes this week, amounting to \$364.20. The O. C. & E. have not paid their taxes yet, and there are several heavy resident taxpayers who have not yet paid. All told 600 receipts for taxes have been issued by sheriff Lands. This does not cover quite one-third of the names on the tax roll.

Mrs. Dr. S. S. Pearse, of Oakland California, died at her home in that city last week. Mrs. Pearse resided in Toledo for some time, where she was universally beloved by all who knew her. She was the owner of considerable property in this place at the time of her death. Her death was sudden, being caused by some heart affection.

Miss Effie Crosno is at work in the county clerk's office recording the various instruments that have been accumulating there since the services of a deputy had been dispensed with. Mr. Jones has employed this deputy and says that he will expect the court to allow the expenses of Miss Crosno, as his attorney advises him that they will be compelled to do so.

Austin Rosebrooks has a walking stick that is both unique and valuable. It was made about 60 years ago by an old New Bedford whaler while on a whaling voyage, and was presented to Mr. Rosebrooks' father. It is made of a whale tusk with the head and point made of ivory. It is a handsome stick and must have cost the maker many a weary hour to make it.

Arthur Rochester has a force of men at work taking the machinery out of the old wreck of the steamer Yaquina City, that has lain on the sands of South Beach for some eight or ten years. This machinery has been almost entirely covered with sand, and it is said that the tubes in the boilers are yet good. To take a look at the old wreck as she lays in the sand one would hardly think there was anything in her worth saving.

A proposition was made by the attorneys on each side in the suit for salaries in this county, to have the county court draw warrants in favor of the clerk and sheriff for the amount that would be due them under the salary as set by the county court, and that the acceptance of these amounts by the officers should not prejudice the case now pending. This the court refused to do, being willing to order the warrants drawn only as payment in full of salaries. So no salary warrants were drawn for the clerk or sheriff last term of court.

An Important Deal.

A real estate deal was closed in this place last Tuesday that will be of considerable importance to the town. M. M. Hufford sold to John Ofstadahl a corner lot on the corner of Hill and Fourth streets, just west of M. L. Trapp's property. The lot is 50x105 feet in size and the consideration was \$650 cash. Mr. Ofstadahl will proceed as soon as the weather will justify, in building a solid and substantial business house upon the ground. The building, we are informed, will be of frame 50x80 in size, two stories high, with basement beneath. Two handsome and complete storerooms will be arranged on the ground floor, and the upper story will be arranged as a hall. The building, when completed, will be an ornament to town. One of the storerooms will be occupied by Mr. Ofstadahl with a general store.
