THE STONE ALL RIGHT.

Nothing is the Matter With the Stone At Pioneer--It Needs Seasoning.

And so it happily turns that the stone at the big Pioneer quarry is all right after all. The only trouble was that the stone was green and needed seasoning. Mr. John B. McGilvery, the San Francisco contractor who is using the stone, came up on the last steamer and carefully inspected the stone at the quarry, and did not hesitate to pronounce the stone all right. The cracking of the stone was nothing unusual, but was to be expected from stone taken from similar quarries if exposed to the hot rays of the sun before it had time to season. He stated that stone just taken out of a wet quarry would check and crack just like green lumber. He pronounced the stone all right and said that it should be allowed to season a few days in the shade after being taken out of the quarry.

In the light of this good news the work at the quarry was again started up and will go steadily forward. The continuing of the work and the favorable report of the contractor gives a great deal of satisfaction not only to the quarry company but to the people of the whole county as well. The stone industry is one that means much to our county. Thousands of dollars in wages are annually expended at Pioneer and the benefits to the surrounding country are correspondingly large.

Decided Against the Employees.

Some two years ago the employees of the Oregon Pacific railway company brought suit against the Farmers Loan & Trust company for back pay due them while working under a receiver that had been appointed upon the instance of the Trust company. The case was first tried in the Benton county circuit court and decided adversely to the employees. It was appealed by their attorneys, Messrs. D'Arcy & Bingham, of Salem, to the supreme court which court handed down a decision last Saturday affirming the decision of the lower court. The decision was rendered by Judge Bean, and in it he said:

"This was an appeal from an order of the circuit court of Benton county, denying the petition of certain employees of the receivers of the Oregon Pacific railroad company for an order requiring the plaintiff in the foreclosure suit, in which such receivers were appointed, to pay the wages of the petitioners. The petitioners were employed by the receivers to operate the road, and as the property did not earn enough to pay the expenses, they, the employees petitioned the court to order the plaintiff in the foreclosure suit to deposit with the court the money for the payment of wages. This order was denied and the petitioners appealed. The action of the lower court is affirmed."

We have received notice of the annual assembly of the Chautauqua association that meets at Gladstone Park, Oregon City, in July of this year. The list of celebrities, state and national, that have already been secured for the assembly assures it being one of the grandest meetings ever held on the Pacific coast. The talented Col. Robt. A. Miller, as president of the association, and his able corps of assistants, are sparing no efforts to make the meeting this year a grand success.

OREGON STONE IN 'FRISCO.

Lincoln County Furnishes Material For The Spreckles Building.

The Oregonian of last Monday, says:

"Mr. John McGilvery, of Denver, who has a contract to furnish 57,000 cubic yards of stone used in the new Spreckles building, in San Francisco, left for that city Saturday, after a hurried visit to Oregon.

The stone used in the construction of the Spreckles building comes from an Oregon quarry, in Lincoln county near Yaquina. It is taken out in huge blocks weighing from 10 to 18 tons each, sent to the seaboard on cars, and there shipped to San Francisco on the steamer Farallon.

It was recently discovered at the quarry that some of the blocks in some unaccountable way were cracking, and the foreman in charge refused to ship any more of the stone until Mr. McGilvery, the contractor arrived to investigate. The contractor lost no time in coming Yaquina, and it was speedily ascertained that the cracking was due to the exposure of the freshly quarried stone to the sun's rays, causing the sap to evaporate too quickly. This was easily remedied by keeping the stone in the shade for a time before shipment.

Mr. McGilvery is one of the big building contractors of the country, having supervised the construction of all the large buildings in Denver, and has been awarded contracts in all parts of the country. He has a high opinion of the Oregon stone used in the Spreckles building, and says that the contracts recently made in San Francisco distinctly specify that construction shall be of Oregon stone. The Parrot building in San Francisco is built of stone coming from near Yaquina, and it is now now apparently better condition than when first laid two years ago.

It has been stated by the authorities that in construction of the new custom house in Portland, preference would be given to Oregon stone, if it could be furnished in sufficient quantity and proper durability. From the report of Mr. McGilvery, it would appear that such conditions could be met."

The "Summer School" at Newport.

Chas. H. Burggraf, an architect of Salem, is preparing plans for the "Summer School" building to be erected at Newport in this county. This structure will be in three departments—a reception room, auditorium and stage. The auditorium will be of octagonal shape 70x70, and will have a seating capacity of 1,400. The stage will be 14x28. In the auditorium is a gallery around the sides and front with raised seats. The height of the auditorium is 32 feet.

At the right of the main entrance is to be an octagon reception room twenty feet in diameter, to be supplied with a large fire-place. There will be one large main entrance and four exits—two being on the sides.

The site of the building is near Nye Creek, or between the residence of S. G. Irvin and the beach.
