## An Important Land Office Ruling.

A decision has been received at the Oregon City land office from Commissioner Hermann that has the effect of removing the disability that has been supposed to attach to "sooners" on government domain, and which until a comparatively recent date unquestionably did attach. The question came up in connection with the homestead entries of Martin Hammer and John Micek (Mitchell), who took lands in the Siletz reservation. It was shown that they had entered the reservation before the time named in the president's proclamation, and such entrance was deemed by the local land office to defeat the claim of the parties to any of the reservation land, in accordance with the president's warning that persons entering upon and occupying lands there before noon of July 25, 1895, should never be permitted to enter any of said lands or acquire any title thereto. In the case of the Siletz reservation a penalty was named in the proclamation, it being that no "sooner" would "ever be permitted to enter any of said lands or acquire any rights thereto." But the commissioner says the statute provided no penalty for such previous entrance, leaving the plain inference that the president's proclamation on that point was unauthorized. So he holds that no grounds exist for adjudging the forfeiture of the said entries.

This ruling is one of much importance to the Siletz country, and will open the way for many new entries there.

The shipping of hay into Lincoln county seems a good deal like carrying water to the sea, yet that is just what has been done here this spring. The last winter was a hard one and the feed was all used up long before the grass got good. We hope to see enough hay put up in this county hereafter so that the people will have some to sell instead of being compelled to buy.
