One of the changed condition of affairs that will materially help Toledo and the surrounding country is that we have got to relying on ourselves. A few years ago when the railroad was booming everything and the appropriation money was being spent, people of Yaquina bay got to depending too much on these resources. The majority of the land owners did not look so much to their farms and ranches as a source of living, as they hoped to sell them for large sums of money and live on the proceeds. The towns followed in the same way, largely. We were all the time looking for an appropriation, or for the railroad to do something. In the last three years there has been a material change in these things. We have struck out for ourselves. We have hopes and aspirations for a deep water harbor and an extension of the O. C. & E. over the mountains, yet we have quit living on these hopes. Our farmers are turning their attention to stock raising, to farming and producing from the soil; our town people have turned their attention toward building up and increasing their business on the resources now available. We are self supporting. New settlers are coming in and the outlook is brighter. Meanwhile if the good things that we long hoped for from the railroad and the harbor improvements materialize, we will be all the more ready to profit by it.

Stirring up the Government Engineers

The Oregon delegation is impressing upon the engineering department the necessity of continuing the improvement at Yaquina bay. The engineers, however, are seemingly opposed to the idea. Congress has authorized, though it has not directed, the department to let a continuing contract for the completion of the work at a cost not exceeding \$1,000,000. The entire Oregon delegation is asking the department to let the contract. Congressman Tongue has been particularly active in this matter, and says: "I can scarcely see what right the engineering department has to refuse to carry out the legislation adopted by congress and signed by the president." The completion of the O. C. & E. across the state will depend much upon the further improvement of the harbor at Yaquina.—Salem Statesman.

Editor LEADER:—I noticed in last week's issue of your paper that Jack Oglesby, of this vicinity, has been in your town, making public his neighborhood grievances.

Poor old Jack. Such grievances seem a commodity he carries with him in every neighborhood (as near as I can learn), that has been unfortunate enough to claim him as a resident. Now in regard to the road he is whineing about. When he was circulating the petition to get this road surveyed to Toledo some refused to sign it for the reason they did not want an open road, but he assured them a gateway was all he wanted until the road should be finished to Toledo. At present there is five miles of the road at this end so far completed that a wagon passed over it a few times last year, but could not do so at present. But this is the way he keeps his word,—as good though as can be expected from a chronic grumbler. One of the eight gates he speaks of, however, opens from his own field. He evidently does not want that taken off. Then the road does not go through the piece of land he pretends to hold, notwithstanding I have been told he has had the benefit of both home-stead and pre-emption rights, or it is not at all likely he would be yelling open road. It works quite a hardship on me having to take the gates off just at present, as I am a poor man and have no timber fit for fencing. If I could have had time to enable me to fence I should not object to the road. At present, if the gates are taken off, my whole crop is exposed to the ravages of all the breachy stock of this part of the country. I do not mind to divide pasture with Mr. Oglesby, but intend to try to protect my crop till I can finish my fence, which will not be long, as I have the material mostly ready. The much abused man will not have to wait much longer on me.
