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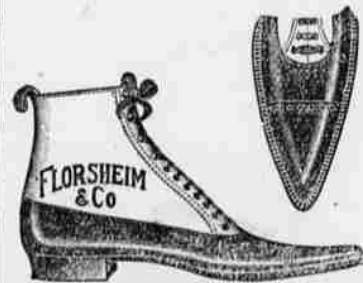

DECORATION DAY

Was Duly Observed in Toledo Last Monday.

Decoration day falling on Sunday this year the G. A. R. post of this place decided to hold decoration services on Monday the 31st. Memorial day was observed by the G. A. R. post and W. R. C. of this place, by meeting at their headquarters on Sunday morning and marching in a body to the court house where religious services were held, the memorial sermon being preached by Rev. Tonkins, of Newport. Rev. Tonkins took for a text the following: "What mean ye by this day," and delivered a very able sermon from it.

On Monday at 9 o'clock the members of the G. A. R. post and W. R. C. again assembled at their headquarters and in company with several visiting comrades, headed a large delegation that marched out to the cemetery to decorate the graves. Arriving there the beautiful ritualistic service of the Grand Army was rendered. The depositing of the flowers by the old comrades upon the graves in memory of their comrades who have answered to the last bugle call, and the decorating of the graves of the unknown dead by the ladies of the Relief corps and the children were very beautiful and touching ceremonies. These ceremonies were interspersed with music by the fife and drum and singing.

After the ceremonies by the Post and Corps a recitation was rendered by Bert Ewing. The ceremonies were then adjourned till two o'clock to meet at the court house. At that time the Post and Corps again assembled at their headquarters and marched to the court house, where the following program was rendered:

He receives callers and entertains them all the time, and can do about anything he could do in a hotel except to leave jail. This is an injurious farce, too, because it increases the belief, already too prevalent, that there is one justice for the wealthy and quite another for the poor.—Exchange.
