A single stick of lumber scaling 10,270 by Doyle's rule, and 8,624 feet by Scribner's was sawed at a Tacoma saw mill a few days ago. It is the largest board ever on exhibit in Tacoma, and goes on record as the giant stick on Puget Sound lumber. No millman in that vicinity ever remembers seeing its equal turned out by any saw mill on the Sound.

S. A. Clarke, the veteran fruit grower and horticulturist of Salem, was an applicant for the position recently given Benton Killen by the secretary of agriculture. Mr. Clarke became a republican with the formation of that party and has whooped it up ever since. He don't seem to appreciate being turned down for a democrat. But such is life.

Hood river strawberry shipments began May 11, with a crate and a half, and increased steadily, amounting to 125 crates on the 18th, and 1,500 on the 25th. Friday night three carloads were shipped, besides those going for small orders in the express car. Next week will probably see the shipments touch their high-water mark. This means over \$4,000 a day income.

Honeyman, DeHart & Glenn, contractors for the Astoria-Goble railroad, have received orders to complete the road by October 1st. They intend to have it done by that time, and consequently will increase their forces at once. They have now about 500 men employed, and in a few days will have seven dredges at work, building grades across tidelands, and will increase their force to 700 or 800 men.

"We are pushing construction as fast as possible," said J. J. Maney, contractor for the Astoria & Columbia river railroad, "and expect to finish it this fall. It will be a first-class road, of very expensive construction, for we have eleven miles of trestle along the river at one point. C. P. Huntington has just been over the road, and it is generally understood to be a part of his system. This is the fourth attempt to build the road, and over \$1,000,000 has been sunk in unsuccessful attempts."

After many doubts anent the coming of the battle-ship Oregon, the citizens of Portland are now acquainted with the blunt fact that she will not come. The silver service committee, after a campaign of influence, instruction and appeal, has given over the expectation of bringing the vessel, and now accept the second best thing to be had, namely, the request for the presence of some vessel of the navy. A rule of the navy department is unearthened forbidding vessels of the Oregon's class to enter a bar harbor, under which division the entrance at the mouth of the Columbia is placed.—Statesman.

Litigation at Pioneer Quarry.
J. M. and J. H. Howell, of Salem, have sued Geo. W. and Geo. E. Davis, as the firm of Davis & Son, for a breach of contract and for damages. The suit is brought in the district court of Marion county, and the litigation is over the Pioneer sandstone quarry at Pioneer in this county. It is alleged by the plaintiffs that they leased the Pioneer sandstone quarry to Messrs. Davis & Son, who agreed to operate it and to pay a rental therefor a certain royalty on the stone sold. They claim that this contract has been broken by Messrs. Davis & Son, and that the latter have ceased working the quarry and have opened up a new ledge and are selling the stone from the same under the name of "Pioneer Sand Stone," which name the plaintiffs allege is their duly registered trade mark.

A temporary injunction was asked restraining Davis & Son from using the name of "Pioneer Sand Stone" for any stone but that taken from the ledge of Howell Son.

John A. Wanamaker is the latest recruit to the ranks of the calamity howlers. In a speech recently he announced that the time had come to organize a new party.

Gov. Budd, of California, has refused to interfere in the sentence of Durrant, and there seems no alternative but that the execution will take place on June 11, one week from tomorrow. Durrant still proclaims his entire innocence of the terrible crime.

Five thousand five hundred head of 2, 3 and 4-year-old sheep were shipped from Heppner Tuesday, which finishes a shipment of 10,000 head by Sharkey & Fargher to North Dakota, where they will be put on the range until fall, and then put on the market.

The last crop bulletin has this to say of the fruit prospects:
"The fruit prospects are difficult to determine. The prune crop is in some sections reported to be full, in other sections it is reported to be small. The prune crop will be small in the majority of orchards, though in a few localities, for unexplained reasons, a fair crop will result. Cherries are ripening and they are not a full crop, though some varieties of trees are as well filled as they should be. The peach crop now promises to be good. The apple and pear crops will not, as a rule, be full. Owing to the variation in reports, it is not possible to particularize where the fruit promises well and where not; but it is certain that, taken as a whole, the prune, cherry, apple and pear crops will be larger than in 1896, but not so large as in 1895."
