At its regular meeting last Monday night the city council accepted the new bulkhead from the contractor, Frank Tillotson, and they also let the contract for driving twenty-seven piles in front of the bulkhead for a wharf. There was one bid for furnishing and driving piles and one for furnishing piles. The bid for furnishing and driving was made by J. H. McMurray and was for \$126.60. F. M. Stanton was the other bidder, and his bid was to furnish the piles for 7 cents per lineal foot. The bid of J. H. McMurray was accepted. It was also ordered that bids be advertised for decking the wharf. The council also ordered a sidewalk laid on the north side of Second street from Hill street to Graham street. The committee on ordinances was instructed to draft an ordinance to provide for a license on dogs running at large in the city limits. Notice was also ordered given of the intention of opening and improving the south half of First street from the bulkhead to the school house. The most important action taken by the council, however, was to instruct the city recorder to proceed to foreclose the liens on all property delinquent for street improvements.
