A lodge of United Artisans will be instituted at this place next Saturday night. The Elk City assembly will come down in force and assist in instituting the new assembly and see that the "grand bumper" degree is properly conferred upon the new members.

The new vault at the court house has been completed and the books are now stored therein. The vault is fully double the original size, and is much more convenient and commodious. Mr. Thiel deserves credit for the substantial improvement he has thus made.

The work on the Summer School building at Newport has been begun. Last week two car loads of lumber was received from the front and has been placed on the ground. It is the intention to push the work forward as rapidly as possible, in order to have the building ready for occupancy by the time the school should open.

That ball game at Newport Saturday is liable to be a hot one. Toledo already has two men crippled by practice and no telling how many more will be laid up before the game. Dr. Darnell and Dr. Carter will act as field surgeons for the Toledo club, and Drs. Bayley and Warren for the Newport players. The Toledo club will not be satisfied with less than 45 runs and feel confident that they can beat Newport by at least 40. Newport feels equally confident we understand. Arrangements are being made for a special police force on the ground. There is fear, that great trouble will be experienced in finding some person foolhardy enough to risk his life and act as umpire.

L. K. Brooks is making an interesting experiment with some apple trees. He read an article in the San Francisco Chronicle that the wooly aphid would not work the root of the Northern spy apple, and Mr. Brooks is starting some Northern Spy cuttings. The wooly aphid works on the tree and root both, but they can be destroyed on tree and branches by spraying, but there is no way to destroy them on the roots. If it is true that they will not work on Northern Spy roots then a solution can be found by grafting other varieties on Northern Spy roots. The tops of the trees can then be sprayed and the trees will be safe from this pest. After the roots get started Mr. Brooks will try the aphid on them by placing the aphid on the roots, and thus give it a fair test. Mr. Brooks is an experienced horticulturist, and will test the matter fully.

Sufficient money is on hands in the county school fund to make the apportionment of \$50 to each district, and the county treasurer has notified the county superintendent of that fact. The superintendent will make this apportionment at once, and the distribution of this money, about \$2,300, will be very welcome to the teachers of the county.

This section of the country has been visited by timely and abundant rains during the past week, and as a consequence all vegetation is greatly refreshed, and everything is growing nicely. Some hay was down and is damaged by the rain, but not enough to amount to the great good the rains have done. The gardens are now in excellent condition, and all grain and grass crops have been greatly benefitted. We understand that the rains have not extended generally over the valley, and that that section is badly in need of rain.

The county court and the county clerk did not "get together" last week during the term of the court, the clerk remaining in his own office, the court meeting in the treasurer's office and keeping a record of its own proceedings. Commissioner Godwin took exceptions to the item published in our last issue regarding this matter, and asserts that an injustice has been done the court in the matter. He exhibited a letter from the county clerk saying that he had spoken to Judge Stearns regarding a deputy during the terms of the county court, and that the Judge had expressed a willingness to allow such deputy if the commissioners were willing. Mr. Godwin asserts that he immediately wrote to the clerk giving his consent. Mr. Jones asserts that he never received an answer from either Mr. Godwin or Mr. Williams, the other commissioner. So there the matter rests, being a question of veracity. No matter how the matter stands it is becoming very tiresome to the people. It is no very good advertisement for the county to have the county officers in a wrangle, to say nothing of the inconvenience people doing business with the court are sometimes put to.
