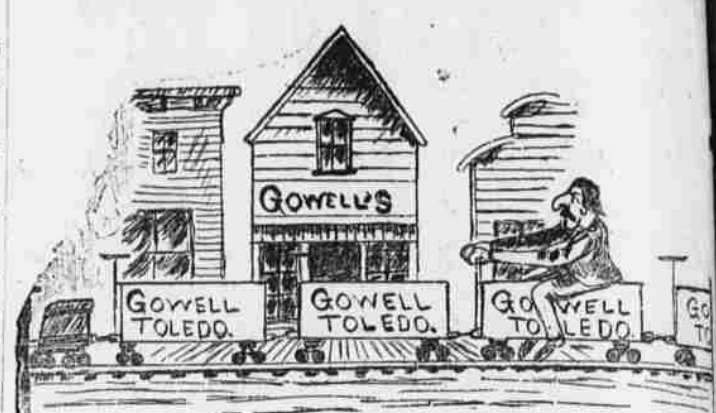

Lincoln county has paid her state taxes in full, the last payment being \$1,088.17, and was forwarded by express by Treasurer Hyde last Friday. Lincoln is among the first counties in the state to make a full settlement with the state treasurer. This money, we suppose, will be carefully locked up in the vaults of the state treasurer where it will stay until the legislature meets and makes the necessary appropriations for it to be paid out on.

Broke His Leg.
Just as we go to press we learn Dolph Taylor met with a serious accident near Newport today. He was riding on the running gears of his wagon, and his foot struck a snag in the road, throwing his leg back against the break beam, breaking his leg just above the right ankle. He was taken to Newport where Drs. Bayley and Warren reduced the fracture.

The first kiln of brick at the Labor Exchange yard on the Enos place near here was fired last Monday morning, and is now burning quite nicely.
