State Teachers' Association.

State Superintendent G. M. Irwin has issued a circular letter and the program of the State Teachers Association at Newport, in which he says:

"The Oregon state teachers' association will begin its annual session at Newport on Monday evening, July 26, 1897, and continue for four days. Arrangements are being made for a successful meeting, and it is hoped that a large number of Oregon teachers will avail themselves of this meeting.

"Following the association will begin the summer school, to be held through the month of August. The work of the summer school is being so arranged that teachers can avail themselves of opportunities to advance their knowledge in any department of school work, and also to acquire advanced knowledge in all studies of interest and profit. The corps of teachers, arranged to take the different departments of instruction, gives assurance of success.

"Every teacher of the state, who can afford the time and means will, no doubt be well repaid for their time and money spent. Greatly reduced rates are given by the Southern Pacific and the O. C. & E. railroads. All persons purchasing tickets will take a receipt for the same at the time of purchase.

"A summer outing cannot be better spent than in Newport, where there will be, under this arrangement, combined business with pleasure.

"At the state teachers' association there is called a convention of all the college presidents to meet on Thursday, July 29th, at 2:00 p. m. Business of importance will come before this convention and all college presidents are earnestly invited to be present.
