ROBBED OF TWENTY DOLLARS.

A Bold Robbery in Toledo on Sunday Night.

Last Sunday night, or Monday morning at some time between two and three o'clock a bold robbery occurred in Toledo that has occasioned considerable excitement. Mr. J. Johnson, an old and infirm man has a small stock of goods and runs a kind of a racket store in his house in the north part of town. Some time Monday morning some one rapped at the door awaking Mr. Johnson and asked to get in. Not knowing what time it was Mr. Johnson got up and lit a small candle and opened the door, expecting to see some customer. What he did see however, was a man of medium size with a mask over his face and a revolver in his hand, and before the astonished old man knew what was coming the revolver was thrust into his face. Mr. Johnson was gritty, though, and he grabbed the revolver and made what resistance he could, but the robber was too powerful for him and he was crowded down onto some boxes where he was practically helpless. He then gave up the struggle and asked the robber what was wanted, and was informed that it was his money he was after. Mr. Johnson told him that he would give it to him if he would let him up, and the robber done so.

Johnson then gave him a bag or package of silver which he had in the showcase, amounting to about \$20, and the thief departed. Before he left Mr. Johnson asked him his name, and the robber told him that he was an Indian. In the scuffle the robber lost his hat which was recovered and is now in the hands of an officer.

Sheriff Landis and Deputy Ross are working up the case and feel confident that they will soon get their man. Not much weight is attached to the finding of the hat, as it is regarded by many as a clumsy attempt to throw the officers onto the wrong trail, the hat probably being one stolen for the occasion. The statement of the robber that he was an Indian is also regarded as an attempt to fool Johnson and the officers. Mr. Johnson describes the robber as a man of medium or small size, but in the excitement of the occasion and in the dim light he failed to recognize him.

THE BRYAN EXCURSION.

Arrangements have been made to run an excursion from Yaquina and all other O. C. & E. points in this county to Lebanon to the Bryan speaking at that place next Monday. The excursion will be attached to the Sunday special and will leave Yaquina at 5:55 p. m., arriving in Albany that evening, where a stop over will be made until next morning at 7:30 when a special train will run from Albany to Lebanon in time for the speaking. After the speaking the train will return to Albany in time to catch the regular O. C. & E. train to the Bay. The fare from all stations in this county to Albany and return will be \$1.50, and the fare for round trip from Albany to Lebanon will be 50 cents, making the total cost \$2.00 for round trip to Lebanon. Bed, breakfast and dinner can be obtained in Albany for 25 cents each. A good many people have signified their intention of going on this excursion as it is the first one from the Bay to the Valley that has ever been given. Arrangements will be made for ample accommodations in railroad coaches and at the hotels, so that the excursionists will have an enjoyable time. Parties having business outside can get their tickets extended by paying fifty cents per day additional.
