LOCAL NOTES

County Judge Stearns came up from Alsea Tuesday.

Judge Fred'k D. Carson made a business trip to Albany and Corvallis the first of the week, returning last evening.

E. M. Mays, J. H. Blair, Daniel Howery and Henry Palmer drove down from Elk City last Tuesday and transacted business in this place.

Attorney H. Denlinger went to Newport Tuesday evening to take the testimony in the case of Matthews vs. the sheriff of Lincoln county, being a case in attachment.

Hon. W. P. Keady, of Portland, was in this place on business Tuesday. Mr. Keady represented Benton county in the legislature in 1893, at which time he was speaker of the house. He has considerable property in this county.

County Assessor Lutz has most of the field work done this year except that in the towns, the principal work to be yet done being in Newport, Yaquina and Toledo. He expects to begin work on the rolls about the first of August.

Jos. Adams, a son of John Adams, of Siletz, returned from the great Indian school at Carlisle, Penn., last Friday. Mr. Adams has been studying medicine and graduated in that branch of learning, but is still going to school. He will stay in this county until about the first of September when he expects to return to Carlisle.

Emma Center, a sister Samuel Center, of Siletz, arrived in this place yesterday evening and went to Siletz, where she will make her brother an extended visit. Her home is in New Hampshire, and she came across the continent to San Francisco with the throng of Christian Endeavorers, and came from that place over the Southern Pacific to Albany, at which place she was met by her brother who accompanied her to his home.

Dr. Merriwether, who recently left the Siletz agency for the Pima reservation in Arizona writes that the weather gets somewhat warm down there in his new location, as it is very common for the thermometer to reach as high as 120 degrees above zero. He says, however, that they do not suffer severely with the heat, owing to the exceeding dryness of the atmosphere. He states that the government does but very little for the Indians on that reservation compared with the favors the Indians here receive.

Ralph Daniels, who was arrested last week on the charge of arson, of which mention was made in our last issue, was taken before Justice Henderson, of Little Elk precinct to have his preliminary examination. He waived examination and in default of bonds was brought to Toledo last Thursday by Constable Derrick and turned over to the sheriff who placed him in jail to await the action of the grand jury soon to convene. There are several conflicting stories concerning the matter on which Daniels was arrested, and the grand jury will probably have quite a task in unraveling them.

However he did do so, but he feels like he is just that much out of pocket.

Mr. Yates, who is attorney for the county in the case of officers suit for salary, informed us when in town this week that they were willing now to agree to an advancement of the case on the docket of the supreme court to an early hearing. It is to be hoped that this be done and a speedy settlement of the matter be reached. The people would like to see the matter settled. If allowed to take its regular place on the docket of the supreme court it would not come to a hearing for at least two years. By all means get the case advanced and get it settled.

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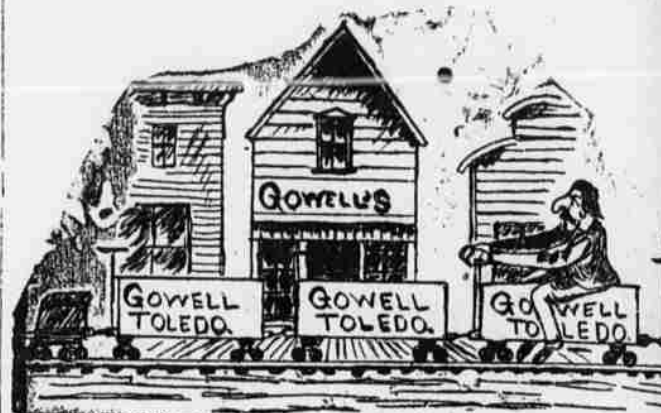
