We also know during the last two or three weeks that the expert worked that Judge Stearns also worked with him, called off figures, etc., and a part of this work was done behind locked doors. A fair and impartial report by a fair and impartial man is what the people of the county wanted, not a report by Judge Stearns, nor one that he has carried around for weeks, exhibiting it to those whom he saw fit.
