AN OBSERVATION.

Toledo, Ore., July 27, 1897.

Editor LEADER:—
It seems to me that one of the greatest industries of a coast county is being sadly overlooked. Now in 1890, when first landing in this part of the world, I observed during the heavy fogs, that sometimes envelope this part of the country, that the salmon would appear on the banks of our streams to feed. Perhaps being from a prairie state I observed such things closer than the average Oregonian. But later, after becoming possessed of a tract of land and enclosing same with a substantial fence consisting of three barwires and a board, I not only observe the fish coming out on the river bank, but fully a quarter of a mile back from the river they appear and actually going through or over such fence as enclose my domain, make haste to devour my garden. Now as I before observed, it seems to me where salmon are so thick that they might be killed with a club, and on dry land at that, that we are sadly in need of a canneryman with a little capital. This may perhaps sound a little fishy to some, but, be that as it may, it is the scaly truth and nothing but the truth.
