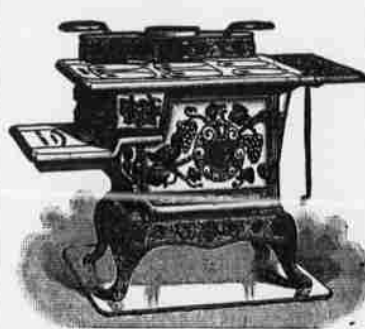

The supreme court has rendered an opinion in the state tax case sent up from Multnomah county, and the effect of the decision is that the counties must pay the state taxes out of first moneys received in the county funds. The court holds that the other funds are exempt, such as road funds, school funds, etc. By this decision the counties will have to pay into the state treasury the state taxes, and let the money lie there until the next legislature convenes, or until the governor sees fit to call an extra session.

Great dissatisfaction is felt by the people of the coast generally, and of Oregon, particularly, over the make up of Speaker Reed's committees. The Oregon delegation does not get a single important chairmanship, nor in fact an important place on any of the committees. It makes Oregonian's sigh for the bygone days of Hermann.

Our Smaller Colleges.

"There are a few striking facts about the small American college," writes Edward W. Bok in the August Ladies' Home Journal. "One striking fact is that sixty per cent. of the brainiest Americans who have risen to prominence and success are graduates of colleges whose names are scarcely known outside of their own states. It is a fact, also, that during the past ten years the majority of the new and best methods of learning have emanated from the smaller colleges, and have been adopted later by the larger ones. Because a college happens to be unknown two hundred miles from the place of its location does not always mean that the college is not worthy of wider repute. The fact cannot be disputed that the most direct teaching, and necessarily the teaching most productive of good results, is being done in the smaller American colleges. The names of these colleges may not be familiar to the majority of the people, but that makes them none the less worthy places of learning. The larger colleges are unquestionably good. But there are smaller colleges just as good, and, in some respects, better. Some of the finest educators we have are attached to the faculties of the smaller institutions of learning. Young girls or young men who are being educated at one of the smaller colleges need never feel that the fact of the college being a small one places them at a disadvantage in comparison with the friend or companion who has been sent to a larger and better-known college. It is not the college: it is the student."

TEACHERS' EXAMINATION.

Notice is hereby given that for the purpose of making an examination of all persons who may offer themselves as candidates for teachers of the schools of Lincoln county, the county school superintendent thereof, will hold a public examination at the public school building at Newport, Oregon, beginning on August 11th, and continuing three days. Teachers eligible to state certificates, state diplomas, or state life diplomas, must present recommendations and make application at the same time. An applicant who is a stranger to the county superintendent must present satisfactory written testimony of good moral character from two or persons of respectable standing. Applicants not present at the opening will not be permitted to take the examination.
