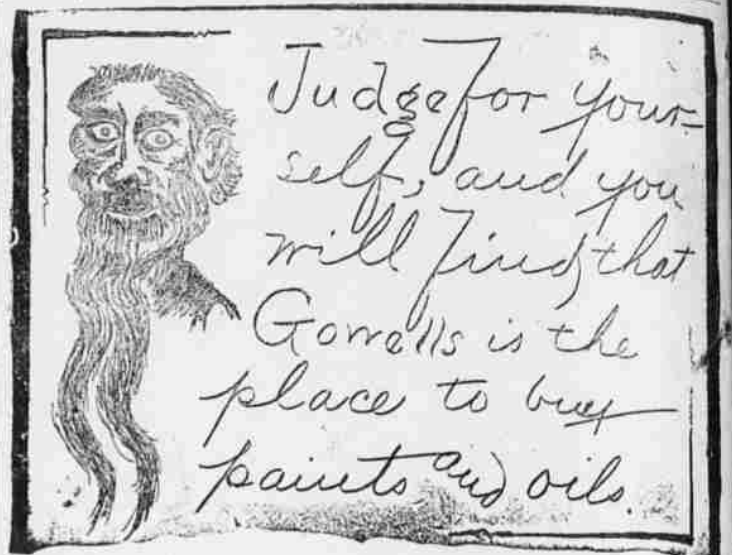
A TIMELY WARNING.
