The agricultural editor of the
Portland, Me., Express thus an-
swers a correspondent who wanted
to know how to keep his neighbor's
hens out of his garden: "Dear Cor-
respondent—Take a lot of small,
stiff cards, about 1x2 inches; write
on them: 'Please keep your darned
old hens at home.' Tie a short
string to each card, with a grain of
corn at the other end of the string,
and scatter them where the hens
congregate. When the hungry
biddy gobbles up the grain that
draws the prize, she follows up the
string, stowing it away until she
comes to the card. Then you see
her put out for home, carrying in
her mouth your polite request."

"I read with interest," writes a
young man from Topeka to the
Atchison Globe, "of your account
of the usefulness of the hen in
Klondike gold-mining, and will
accept the suggestion. I leave for
Klondike next week and will take
with me a coop containing six hens
and a rooster, instead of a pick and
pan. I have figured it out that by
turning my chickens loose they will
scratch over more gold in a day
than I could with a pick in a month.
If each hen scratches up gold dust
valued at \$6.745 per season, and
the young chickens go to scratching
as soon as they are hatched, some
idea of the wealth I will bring
home may be obtained by your
statistician. I am counting on hav-
ing thirty young chickens in the
field within three months after I
get there."

Here is Oregon's game law in a
nut shell. Game and fish can be kill-
ed only during the following season:
Grouse, Mongolian pheasants and
quail, September 1st to December
1st. Prairie chickens, July 1st to
October 1st. Wild ducks and
water fowls, September 1st to March
15th. Deer, mountain sheep, etc.,
August 1st to December 1st. Kill-
ing for hides or parts of carcass
only is prohibited. Killing spotted
fawn is prohibited. East of the
Cascades it is unlawful to kill at
any time Chinese pheasants, quail
or Bob White quail. Trout, April
1st to November 1st. Salmon,
December 15th to November 1st.
Explosives to kill fish, nets, seines,
obstructions to free passage of fish,
etc., prohibited.

The largest balloon in the world
was constructed at Holloway, near
London, England. It is a sphere
of 57.24 feet diameter, has a ca-
pacity of over one hundred thousand
cubic feet, weighs one and a quarter
tons, and will lift an additional
weight of a ton. It is to be used
for the purpose of obtaining con-
tinuous meteorological observa-
tions for a period of six days with-
out descending. It has been suc-
cessfully tested.

The Canadian government often
shows an enterprise which our own
government might well copy. It
has made application to the author-
ities at Washington to be permitted
to build a telegraph line from some
point on the coast of Alaska to
Tagish, across the summit of the
mountain range, nearly 100 miles.
If it is the purpose of Canada to
construct a telegraph line to Dawson
City, and to do it this fall, its
enterprise is one which deserves to
be highly commended. There is
no good reason, now that the Yukon
valley is assuming such business
importance, why it should not be
connected by telegraph with the
outside world, so that we may
know at all times what is going on
there.

The report of the commissioner
of education for the year ending
July 1, 1897, has just been com-
pleted. It shows a total enrollment,
in that year, in the schools and
colleges, both public and private,
of 15,997,197 pupils. This was an
increase of 308,557. The number
in public institutions was 14,465,371
and in private institutions 1,531,-
826. In addition to all these there
were 118,000 pupils in the various
special schools and institutions,
including business colleges, music
conservatories, Indian and reform
schools, making a grand total en-
rollment, for the whole country, of
16,415,197.

Great excitement prevails at
Trinity Center, California, and vi-
cinity, over a rich strike made by
the Graves Bros. and H. Crater in
the drift claim on Conferee creek.
In four days they took out three
water buckets full of gold, or
\$68,000. The largest piece weighed
\$12,000. They expect to take
between \$150,000 to \$200,000 out
of the pocket. The gold is coarse,
and lies between walls of porphyry,
and resembles melted gold poured
in the seams.

Grand old Texas is very kind to
her children, remarks the Dallas
News. This year's product will
give to each inhabitant one bale of
cotton, six bushels of wheat and
forty bushels of corn, one fat hog,
two bushels of peaches, twenty
bushels of oats, one quarter of beef,
thirty dozen eggs, ten chickens,
one turkey, two pounds of honey,
ten pounds of wool, half of mutton,
half bushel of Irish potatoes, twenty
watermelons, and many things un-
necessary to mention.

F. L. Post, of McMinnville, says
that from thirty early peach trees
in his orchard he sold \$60 worth of
peaches. The trees stand 200 to
the acre, all heavily loaded, and at
the same average return will yield
him \$400 per acre. He has 600
trees.
