DIED.

MILLER.—At the home of his parents, near Elk City, on Saturday, August 14, 1897, Leonard Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Miller.

The deceased appeared in usual health until Friday, when their house caught fire and in helping put out the fire he became exhausted and death claimed him at 2 o'clock p. m. the next day. He was laid to rest in the Elk City cemetery on Sunday. The bereaved family have the sympathy of the entire community.

OBITUARY.

Leonard Miller was born December 19, 1880; died August 14, 1897; aged 16 years, 7 months and 25 days.

Leonard was a bright, promising young man and his loss will be severely felt in the family circle and community. For a year or two his health has been poor but his final sickness was only of a few days.

It seemed that he had been led to think seriously of the liability of early death, and the necessity of a preparation. Remarks made to his mother show that the Christian faith had been accepted and on his death bed he was resigned and answered that his trust was in the Lord.

A very large gathering was in attendance at his funeral, which was conducted by Rev. T. M. Ramsdell. Many tributes of flowers manifested the public sympathy, and the bereaved family felt a thankfulness for this manifestation of sympathy.

He was buried appropriately near Elk City.
