TO PREVENT FOREST FIRES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and
House of Representatives of the
United States of America in Con-
gress assembled, That any person
who shall wilfully or maliciously
set on fire, or cause to be set on fire,
any timber, underbrush, or grass
upon the public domain, or shall
carelessly or negligently leave or
suffer fire to burn unattended near
any timber or other inflammable
material, shall be deemed guilty of
a misdemeanor, and, upon convic-
tion thereof in any district court of
the United States having jurisdic-
tion of the same, shall be fined in a
sum not more than five thousand
dollars or be imprisoned for a term
of not more than two years, or both.

SECTION 2. That any person who
shall build a camp fire, or other
fire, in or near any forest, timber,
or other inflammable material upon
the public domain, shall, before
breaking camp or leaving said fire,
totally extinguish the same. Any
person failing to do so shall be
deemed guilty of a misdemeanor,
and, upon conviction thereof in any
district court of the United States
having jurisdiction of the same,
shall be fined in a sum not more
than one thousand dollars, or be
imprisoned for a term of not more
than one year, or both.

SEC. 3. That in all cases arising
under this act the fines collected
shall be paid into the public school
fund of the county in which the
lands where the offense was com-
mitted are situated.

JIM BATTEES INTERVIEWED.

He Gives the Corvallis Times some
Pointers on Politics.

A caller at the Times office yes-
terday morning was Jimmy Battees
of Siletz and his visit brought to
mind how Thomas H. Tongue was
elected to congress by a majority of
79 through the 119 Indian votes
cast solidly for him on the Siletz
reservation. Jimmy is a full blood-
ed siwash, but withal an American
citizen, and in very good English
he poured out his anguish of heart
over the fact that he had been
inveigled into support of Tongue.
"Yes we all voted for him, but are
sorry of it now," said Jimmy.
"George McBride wrote a letter to
Harney and told Harney to have
us boys vote for Tongue and we
did it. Yes we voted for Tongue
and 'sound money' and stood in
with the boys and now when any
of us Indian citizens get drunk we
are locked up for thirty days while
the white citizen is only kept five
days in jail. That is what we get
for voting for Tongue and standing
in with the boys. Tongue has
treated us wrong, and I will never
vote for him again." Jimmy knows
well enough that the 119 siwash
votes were intended to be thrown
in favor of 'sound money,' and not
to a bill imprisoning siwashes thirty
days to the white citizen five for
ordinary drunkenness such as passed
congress a few weeks ago. He
sees the treachery of the Washing-
ton county statesman in helping
push a temperance measure through
congress to the utter neglect of an
urgently needed financial measure,
and figuratively speaking, Jimmy's
scalping knife has been sharpened
and with the rest of his "sound
money" brethren he is reaching for
the scalp of the man whom, by
their own votes, they made con-
gressman for Oregon.
