The first crop was planted early last spring and matured and was harvested. The ground was then plowed and planted with seed taken from the crop that had just been dug. This second crop is now large enough for table use. The same people are also eating their second crop of garden peas grown on the same ground.

Hurley Lutz will erect a new house on his farm on Depot slough this fall.

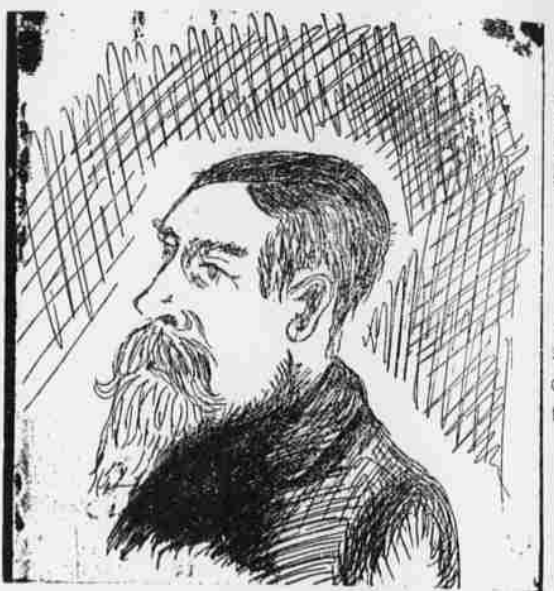

A new run of fish has come into Yaquina Bay and river this fall. They are the Norway mackerel or herring. The fish resemble the ordinary herring except that they are larger. These in the river now are extremely fat, so fat that they easily fry in their own fat. They are running in large schools, and the water seems to be literally alive with fish where a school of them appear. Many people are fishing after them, using a common hoop dip net. They salt them down for winter use. If the run of these fish continue in future years they will be a source of much profit to our fishermen. These fish both dried and salted are considered a great delicacy in the east, readily retailing at ten cents per pound.
