

Talk of an extra session of the legislature is again going around. This time it is said that the session will be called in January. Whether or not there is any prospect for an extra session probably depends upon the fate of Banker Corbett at the hands of the senate in December. Should he be seated it is not probable that an extra session will be called. There does not seem to be much use for an extra session anyway, as under the recent supreme court decisions the secretary of state can do almost everything the legislature can; and whatever he can't do the governor does.

Edwin Stone, manager of the O. C. & E. R. R. who has been suffering from nervous prostration for many weeks, has at last been compelled to relinquish work, and left yesterday for the south on a two month leave of absence.—Corvallis Times.

At the last term of the County Court there were pauper bills allowed in the sum of \$74. This bill represents the cost of maintaining four persons for a period of two months. This is at the rate of \$2.11 per week for each unfortunate supported by the county. Of these four, one, a woman at Yaquina, is allowed \$5 per month for a partial support; another, a man at Chitwood is allowed \$7, and is allowed this on the condition that he deeded his homestead to the county, which he done; another man at Newport is allowed \$10 per month, and the fourth, a woman at Waldport is allowed \$15 per month for her keep. While we have every sympathy for the unfortunate person who must look to the county for support, yet we are constrained to think that the bills now being allowed by the court are in excess of what they should be. It seems to us that the county might make a saving by securing one person to keep two or more of these county charges. A person living on a farm and growing most of their living could afford to keep all four of these charges for less than \$37 per month. The woman at Waldport surely must be a helpless invalid, or else the amount paid for her support is unreasonably large. Fifteen dollars per month will board a person at a good hotel these days.

Kern Bros. Cannery is still receiving a good catch of fish. It is requiring the full services of the tug Tonquin to carry the pack to Astoria. Four or five cargoes are now awaiting her at the cannery. She left here Saturday last and is due again Monday.

To remove an unjust insinuation against Sam Center, I will state that Mr. Kern gave him that fish.
