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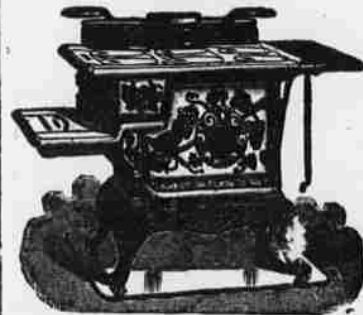
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Notice of Sheriff's Sale.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT BY VIRTUE of an execution issued out of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for Lincoln County, bearing date of October 6, 1897, and attested by the seal of said court and the clerk thereof, on a judgment duly rendered and entered in said court on the 27th day of July, 1897, in a suit therein pending wherein Henry Denlinger, Jr., was plaintiff and Frank O. Bridgman and Lulla Bridgman were defendants, in favor of Henry Denlinger, Jr., plaintiff, and against Frank O. Bridgman and Lulla Bridgman defendants, for the sum of \$116.53, with interest thereon at the rate of eight per cent per annum from the 27th day of July, 1897, and the further sum of \$18.50 with costs of and upon this writ out of the personal property of the said defendants, and in case sufficient cannot be found, then out of the real property in my county belonging to the said defendants on or after the 27th day of July, 1897; I did on the 6th day of October, 1897, levy upon the following described real property to-wit: Beginning at the 1/4 section corner between sections 16 and 17, in Township 11, south, range 10, west of Willamette Meridian, and running thence west forty rods; thence south twenty rods; thence east forty rods; thence north twenty rods to place of beginning, containing five acres, more or less, and all in Lincoln County (formerly Benton County), Oregon; and that I levied on the same as the property of, and belonging to Mrs. Lulla Bridgman, being unable to find personal property belonging to the said defendants upon which to levy said execution out of which to make the amounts mentioned in said execution or any part thereof, and on

COUNTY COURT--OCTOBER TERM.

Full Report of the Proceedings of the Regular Session Last Week.

The county commissioners court was in regular session on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week, all members of the court being present. The following business was transacted:

In the matter of the use of the county road by the O. C. & E. railroad company, at Morrison: Ordered that the railroad be allowed to occupy county road from the main line to the rock quarry with side tracks; provided, that the company shall keep up the road and furnish such crossings as shall be necessary in crossing said track.

In the matter of the petition of A. J. Ray for the segregation of property sold at tax sale: Ordered that lot 10 in block 12, in Virginia addition to Newport be segregated from other property upon the same certificate of sale, and that the petitioner be allowed to redeem said lot by the payment of the taxes, costs and fees, and 8 per cent interest from the date of sale.

In the matter of the petition of L. M. Butler, H. R. Sturdevant and others, for a county road from a point on Olalla slough to the Drift creek road at Mill creek: Ordered that the petition be granted, and that G. C. Stakely, M. Gregson and F. M. Stanton be appointed as viewers, and that Z. M. Derrick, county surveyor, meet with said viewers to survey the same; and that said viewers and surveyor shall meet on Monday, October 25, 1897, at 8 o'clock a. m., and view, survey and locate said road.

In the matter of the collection of taxes under the 1896 tax roll: Ordered that the collection of said taxes be continued under the original roll until the further order of the court.

In the matter of the examination of the 1897 tax roll: The court having carefully examined the same and finding no alterations necessary, it is therefore ordered that the roll as returned by the county board of equalization be approved; and it is further ordered that the levy of the tax thereon be deferred until the session of the state board of equalization.

The editor had peculiar dream the other night. We dreamed that Commissioner Williams claimed thirty miles mileage from Newport and return, not because the distance by the boat and railroad is fifteen miles, it being only thirteen miles but it figures out easier on fifteen miles. We dreamed that after court adjourned that Mr. Williams got into a road cart and went home by the way of the wagon road, thus traveling only eight miles. We dreamed that when the next court convened Mr. Williams came in and stated that he had collected mileage for seven miles that he had not traveled, and paid seventy cents back to the county. Just then we woke up and found it all to have been a dream—at least that part about paying back the excess mileage.

The people on the Yaquina river are direct losers to the amount of several thousand dollars by reason of not having a salmon cannery in operation at some point on the Bay this year. There is an excellent run of fish of good quality, and it is very hard to find a market for them. In fact a great many people are not fishing this season, and many that do fish are not putting in full time, as they are liable to have a good share of their catch left on their hands. The cannery at Newport has not operated this year, the reason given, being that it has not yet sold last year's pack. It is to be hoped that another year will find a cannery in operation upon this Bay. The fish is one of our natural resources from which our people should reap a profit.

The Newport News has been bucking and kicking at the Corvallis Gazette, and has made some grave charges against Burt Johnson, the editor of that paper, in connection with the legislative hold-up of last winter. We will make a guess that the News will not make any more such charges, and that everything between the News and the Gazette will be lovely and serene hereafter. It wont mean that the News has become convinced that it was mistaken, but simply that a political deal has been made which will be to the benefit of the man who is very close to the News.
