NEITHER HERRING OR MACKEREL

To settle the dispute as to the species of the new fish in the Bay, Messrs. Crosno and Bensell sent some samples of the fish to the Agricultural college. The following is Prof. Cordley's reply:

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to report that the fish sent by you are common known as California sardines. They belong with the true sardines and are known scientifically as Clupea pallasii (lineard). They are found along the entire Pacific coast Puget Sound to Magdalena Bay, and are particularly abundant on the California coast, and are considered a most excellent food fish.

The specimens you send were the first of the kind ever received at the college, and should consider it a favor if you could, without too much trouble, send me 10 or 12 more specimens for the museum. Express charge will be paid at this end.

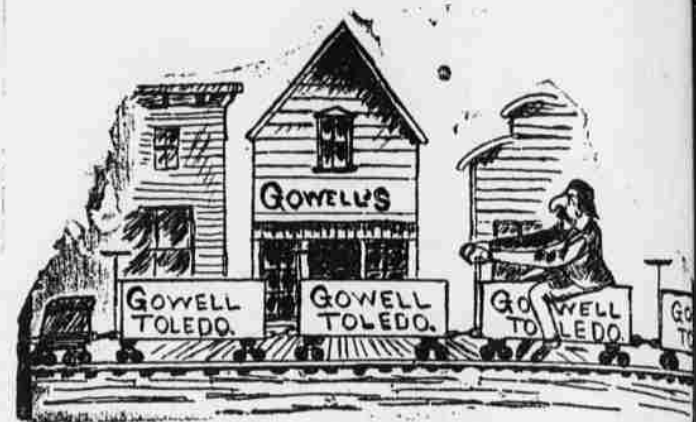

THE YAQUINA HARBOR.

Petition to be Presented by the Willamette Valley People.

The following petition has been prepared by friends of the Yaquina harbor, says the Albany Herald, and it will be circulated and no doubt generally signed through the Willamette Valley. This petition, which will voice the sentiment of a large portion of the people of Oregon, will, it is hoped, assist the Oregon delegation in impressing upon the secretary of war the importance of the improvement to this state. The petition is as follows:

"To the Oregon delegation in Congress:—We, the undersigned citizens of the state of Oregon, respectfully call your attention to the matter of the improvement of Yaquina Bay, for which an appropriation of \$25,000 was made by the last congress to apply towards the completion of the original project; and the same congress authorized a continuous contract of \$1,000,000 in addition for the extension of the present system in accordance with the plans as recommended by the special board of engineers appointed by the president under act of congress to examine and report upon the need and feasibility of the project for securing deeper water on the bar at that place.

Although nearly eighteen months have passed since the act became a law, not one dollar has been expended, nor has a step been taken towards the letting of this contract; while other and less important points where contracts were authorized in the same bill, the contracts are let and the work is now in progress.

Now, in the annual report of chief of engineers it is announced that the secretary has not approved the Yaquina project and therefore no estimates are submitted for the coming year.

The work of improvement so far has cost a large sum of money, the success of the work, and the benefits accruing have justified the expenditure. There is need for deeper water that the transportation facilities may be enlarged. A competent board of engineers have reported that the project is entirely feasible, and the Bay worthy of the improvement. Congress has authorized the necessary outlay, and notwithstanding all this, the money is withheld and the improvement already made allowed to go to destruction.

This is a matter of vital importance to the people of a large portion of Oregon and adjoining states, especially the producers and shippers, and we urge that you as our representatives impress upon the honorable secretary of war the importance of this harbor as a natural outlet for a large territory and insist that he comply with the law, and order this contract at once."

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Ordinance No. 28.

An ordinance to provide for sidewalk on Hill street from intersection of Fifth and Hill Street to the intersection of Hill and Second street.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Toledo:

Section 1. That a sidewalk built on the west side of Hill street from intersection of Hill and Fifth street to the intersection of Hill and Second street in the City of Toledo; that said sidewalk be built on or before the 20th day of November 1897, and that said sidewalk shall be built in the dimensions and manner as provided in the ordinance governing the building of sidewalks on Hill street.

Section 2. The following assessments be and are hereby levied on the abutting property for building said sidewalk:

M. M. Hufford, lot 5, sub-div. block 11, W. A. Fash, lot 6, sub-div. block 11, E. M. Stanton, lot 6 sub-div. block 11, J. Ostahahl, lot 5 south of 4th st. bk. 11, M. M. Hufford, parcel land 100 ft. bk. 11, N. Snow, 50 feet front bk. 11, M. M. Hufford, 60 feet front bk. 11, H. Lewis, 100 feet front bk. 11, O. C. & E. R. Co., 100 feet front bk. 11.

Provided; that if the owners of the abutting property cause a sidewalk to be built in the manner prescribed by the City ordinances on or before the 20th day of November 1897, then these assessments shall be void, otherwise to become due on Nov. 20, 1897.

Passed by the Common Council October 18, 1897.
