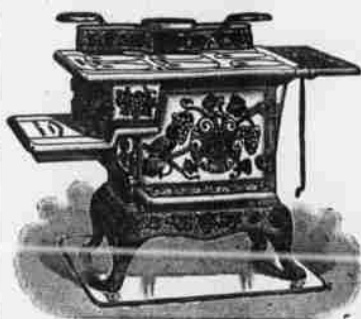

IN EASTERN OREGON.

The Land of Gold and Fair Ladies.

About sixty members of the Oregon State Press Association, and probably thirty guests, left the Union depot at Portland, at 8:30 p. m., of October 14, bound for Baker City and the annual meeting of the association. A jollier crowd probably never boarded a train out of Portland. After renewing old acquaintances and forming many new ones, the writer at midnight sought his bed, an upper tier on the tourist, a half interest of which had been assigned to another party. But owing to the fact that at nearly every station other members of the association came aboard and were not satisfied until Albert Tozier, the popular secretary of the association had awakened all on board. It was very little sleep that anyone secured on that train. However through the ability of Ira Campbell, Chas. Nickell, Albert Tozier, J. S. Dellinger, and a couple who occupied an upper berth, the crowd was nicely entertained.

The train halted for breakfast at the summit of the Blue mountains at the charming Hotel Meacham, where under the motherly care of Grandma Munra, manager of one of the daintiest and most unique railroad eating houses in the world, we were served with one of the best breakfasts that it was ever our lot to eat; and many a poor, hungry editor made the feast of his life. As we had not visited Meacham for over twenty years, not since the Iron horse had united the Inland Empire with Western Oregon, and we noted many changes at this place, and all along from Portland to Baker City, especially at Pendleton and La Grande. The well kept farms of Grand Ronde valley gave evidence of the solid improvements made in this fertile valley:

One thing we noticed in contrast to our Willamette valley farmers, was that in Eastern Oregon the farmers stack their straw in long, neat ricks, whereas most of the straw in the Willamette valley is burned.

From the summit above La Grande we feasted our eyes upon a glorious panorama. To the west in the Cascades, were the everlasting snow capped mountains, in all their grandeur, silent pyramids of God's handwriting, while far in the distance the pine-clad hills of the Blue mountain range were in evidence. At our feet, dressed in her Autumn garb, nestled the valley, with the villages of La Grande and Union far in the distance, and the dark, curling smoke from many a farm house marked the drift of the Autumn clouds.

At one o'clock p. m., we arrived at the Queen City of the West, the coming Denver, soon to be the mining center of the northwest. Here those who chose were provided with conveyances to the hotels. We were glad to stretch our limbs after 18 hours on the train and availed ourselves of the opportunity to walk, and in company with Ex-Johns, cheerfully wended our way to the hotel; but on our way up we stopped to admire Baker City's splendid public school building, which is a credit to any city in Oregon. We were informed that within its brick walls were 900 children, which speaks well for the educational fathers of Baker City. After dinner all adjourned to the Opera house, where a splendid program was rendered, a special feature of which was the excellent singing by the choir, and a solo rendered by Mrs. Weatherby, which caught the ear of the association and caused prolonged applause. At four o'clock nearly all the members of the press met at the K. P. hall where a business meeting was held. In the evening a grand ball was given at the Armory hall in honor of the assembled Knights of the Quill. Excellent music, fair ladies and a smooth floor made it possible for all to enjoy themselves until a late hour.

The rising sun had scarcely chased the crimson colors from the eastern horizon on Saturday morning when all hands were off for Sumpter, thirty miles away over a smooth narrow gauge track from Baker City. Here all enjoyed a free dinner given by the Business Men's association of Sumpter. This booming town is but little more than a year old, but gives evidence of great prosperity and indicates that there are good, rustling business men at the helm. All lines of business are well represented, including a lively, well edited newspaper, the Sumpter News. If a Willamette valley editor could have the amount of advertising in a weekly sheet that this paper has, and at the prices it receives, he would feel like his efforts had been appreciated.

At one o'clock, all having been provided with seats in some kind of a conveyance, we were driven to the group of mines known as the E. and E., Columbian, and the North Pole. Here we were kindly shown through the mines and the quartz mills. To many this was their first visit to an active gold producing mine. These three mines are being worked to their full capacity day and night. They are situated in the mountains ten miles from Sumpter and about one mile apart. Two miles beyond this group of mines is located the famous Bonanza mine, but we did not have time to visit this mine and return to Baker City the same day.

Returning to Baker City, at 8 o'clock a business meeting of the Association was had and officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: Geo. B. Small, Baker City, president; Albert Tozier, Portland, secretary; Chas. Nickell, Jacksonville, treasurer. Whereupon all adjourned to the hotel where the good citizens of Baker had prepared a banquet, at which plates for 150 were laid. Amid speeches and songs the evening soon passed away; and we will say that Baker did herself proud. It was a spread that a city of much larger pretensions might well have been proud of.

At 8 o'clock a. m., while the church bells were ringing out their sweet tones, about twenty-five vehicles loaded with members of the Association and many of the leading citizens of Baker, were speeding over the sage-brush hills for the famous mines seven miles northeast of Baker City, viz: the Flagstaff, the Virtue and the Consolidated Virginia. Arriving at the Flagstaff mine at ten o'clock all enjoyed a hearty breakfast that had been prepared by the managers of this splendid property, after which many availed themselves of an opportunity to go down into the mine, many going down to the 700 feet level. The ore car in which the party was safely conveyed into the bowels of old Mother Earth, is capable of carrying 1,900 pounds weight. It was about the shape of an old-fashioned country comb box, the kind that hangs under the looking glass in the old farm kitchen, as seen in our happy boyhood days. Our party went down three at a time in the comb box, one gentleman and two ladies to keep him straight. Each guest was provided with a lighted candle, and the sight of a hundred or more lighted candles carried by ladies in bright array was a strange sight and was in great contrast to the grim miners that dig and delve all the day long with pick and shovel. This mine, as were all the others we vis-
