Thos. Harrison came up from West Yaquina yesterday. He is a bidder on two of the star mail routes in this county and was in Toledo fixing up his bonds.

Today is shooting match day at Elk City. Al. Waugh, Dye Wade Jack Waugh, Stoney Wells and Everett Jones went up there this morning and will probably bring back their share of the poultry.

Toledo has a literary society in good working order. It meets every Wednesday evening at the old school house. An interesting program has been arranged for tomorrow night. Everybody is welcome to attend.

The new corral of the railroad at this place, is on too low ground. Meaker's cattle made a fearful mudhole out of it Sunday night. It was so bad that several of the cattle mired down. The company intends putting a good layer of rock and gravel in it, and then it will be all right.

The Captain is down at Florence, on the Siuslaw, where he is helping to construct a ship for the Klondike trade. Owing to the epidemic of measles in Toledo school was dismissed last Monday for a period of two weeks. There are numerous cases of measles in town now, and the place is in for a siege of it. Fortunately they are of a very mild type, and but little danger is probable where care is taken of the patient.

The rains of last week made high waters in the streams of Lincoln county. All of them are swollen and are running lots of drift. Frank Grant tells us that when he came to the station last Friday, that all of the bridges on upper Big Elk and Tum Tum were afloat. Some of these bridges were supposed to be far above high water mark.

Mr. Grant reports everything quiet on Big Elk, and says that they had excellent crops up there this year. He says, also, that they are more domestic than sheep, and that they bring better returns.

The report is that he started from Klondike with \$8,000 worth of gold dust, and that when found the dust was gone. The Steamer Truckee Wrecked.

Last Thursday the steamer Truckee, bound for San Francisco became disabled in the storm. When off Coos Bay she attempted to go into that harbor, but the wind drove her onto the north sand spit after crossing the first bar, and she became a total wreck. The crew were rescued by the members of the life saving station.

The Truckee left Yaquina the first of the week with a miscellaneous cargo in her hold. From here she went to Tillamook, where she took on a deck load of lumber and then started for San Francisco. She was caught in the gale of last week and her engines were disabled rendering her helpless. She attempted to sail into the harbor, but the wind was too strong.

Considerable interest is manifested by home merchants about her cargo, several of them having shipments on her consigned to San Francisco.

A Generous Gift.

Today Mr. S. G. Irvin, president of the Summer Educational Association, filed for record a deed from Emma B. Thompson, in behalf of the R. M. Thompson estate, conveying property worth \$1,000 to the Association. Miss Thompson was in attendance at the Association meeting last summer, and was much pleased with the work accomplished, and predicts a bright future for the institution.
