THE CITY ELECTION.

Just one week from today the regular annual city election of the city of Toledo will take place. The offices to be filled are mayor, recorder, treasurer, marshal and three aldermen. Only one regular convention has been held, at which time a full ticket was nominated. Since then three candidates for aldermen have been nominated by a petition of electors. The ticket nominated by the convention on November 6, is designated as the Citizens Ticket, and is as follows:

Treasurer, T. P. Fish.
Marshal, M. J. Allphin.
Aldermen, C. L. Gowell, A. Waugh, Fred Stanton.

The ticket nominated by petition is declared to be "Independent Citizens Ticket" and consists of three candidates for alderman, viz:

A. T. Peterson.

For the benefit of inquirers the recorder would state that the records show that there are warrants outstanding against the city to the amount of \$466.12. The city has available claims to offset the same to the amount of \$33, leaving a net indebtedness of \$433.12.
